Finding A New Rector

THE search for a new Rector for Hethersett and the Meltons has taken a major step forward with the publication of a Benefice Profile for prospective candidates as we describe below.

FOLLOWING the departure of the Rev Derek McClean in March, the Benefice has begun the task of finding a new Rector.

The Benefice consists of three parishes - Hethersett, Great Melton and Little Melton, and a committee has been formed, made up of two representatives from each parish.

The Benefice Standing Committee (BSC) distributed a questionnaire and held a discussion day for parishioners to contribute to a profile which tells potential applicants about the Benefice and the parishes. The BSC presented the profile to the three Parochial Church Councils who approved it on 4th September.

The document now goes to the Archdeacon of Norfolk and Bishop of Thetford to undertake the recruitment process. Anyone who would like a copy of the full profile e-mailed to them should contact churchwarden@hethersettchurch.online.

Compassionate and Enthusiastic

THE new Rector should be compassionate, enthusiastic, inspiring, creative, approachable, a leader and be at the heart of the community.

Those were the main points to come out of the questionnaire and discussion day.

"We are looking for someone who can offer collaborative and sensitive leadership. A team builder who rejoices in encouraging, enabling and releasing

the gifts of others and supporting them in their calling.

"We are looking for somebody who can accept, love and value the existing congregations whilst supporting, nurturing and enabling the introduction of new ideas and being a recognised, approachable figurehead," the document states.

The profile goes on to give details of the Rectory in Hethersett along with

details of the local area and schools and the three churches— St Remigius at Hethersett, All Saints at Little Melton and All Saints and St Mary at Great Melton.

Details are also given of the Benefice team which includes the Rev Christopher Mallett, the Venerable Martin Gray and the Rev Michael Kingston.

The document also highlights some of the "other forms of worship" at the three churches including Messy Church at Little Melton and Hethersett, Toddler Group sessions at Hethersett, Hethersett and District Churches Together and Garden Church.

We thought you might be interested in a few details of these specific activities.

Hethersett Messy Church meets four times a year and currently has between nine and 15 families attending regularly and enjoying crafts, seasonal activities, singing, an informal worship session and a meal. Little Melton Messy Church takes place every school holiday in the church.

Hethersett Toddler Group sessions include play, toys, craft and singing and attracts up to 20 children along with carers. Children starting school are presented with a Lion Story Teller Bible.

Hethersett and District Churches Together arranges joint acts of worship including Remembrance Sunday, the Week of Prayer for Christian Unity, the Good Friday Easter Walk of Witness and service, an open air service in the centre of the village, carol singing outside Tesco's and the Shrove Tuesday pancake evening which is an

introduction to the annual Lent Course. Hethersett and District Churches Together also provided a grant to allow Good News to go full colour this year.

Garden Church is a modern innovation for worship and features a growing network of small organic churches in Norfolk that now includes Great Melton where sessions are usually held in the village cricket pavilion. Meetings include informal worship, along with food and faith.

Thank you to everyone who came out to support the Little Melton Village Show this year.


We had some excellent entries and it was lovely to see lots of new faces in amongst the show regulars.

For this talk Rosemary defined "Alpine" as meaning plants from mountainous regions, worldwide.

There were countless photographs of beautiful flowering plants small and large, of which Rosemary spoke impressively without notes and quoting colloquial and scientific names for almost every specimen shown.

Many of these plants bore names which we easily recognised, their flowering shapes familiar, but many of the species variants previously unknown to all, excepting those who are Alpine plant enthusiasts. Your scribe was surprised to know that a type of tulip grew naturally in the Pyrenees, when folklore has them as originating in Turkey.

Those thinking of taking up growing alpine flowers as a hobby now know that gritty poor quality soil, is a pre-requisite. The Hethersett Gardening Club meets on the third Wednesday of each month excepting December, which is usually on the second Wednesday, at 7.30 pm in the Methodist Church Hall, Great Melton Road.

All are very welcome - occasional visitors are charged $\pounds 2$ and refreshments are included.

Hethersett Hawks Cycle Speedway with Mel Perkins MBE

HETHERSETT Hawks/Yellow Brick Mortgages had seven riders in the North of England adorned in new-style Yellow Brick Mortgages shirts in the British Individual Championships.

Returning to Norfolk they can feel very proud of their efforts with two medals in their kitbags and some other outstanding performances including four fifth places.

Glyn Morgan looked in good form in the Over-60s at Hull but one mistake meant he had to face a race-off against two Poole riders for second and third place. Drawn on the outside he had to work hard but took full advantage when his opponents slipped to storm home to the silver medal.

The other weekend medal went to Lola Martin who has shown consistent improvement this season and achieved third place in the Under-12 Girls at Sheffield. She then went on to compete as a late entry in the Under-14 Girls and gave one of her best performances to finish fifth.

The three Hawks in the Under-12 Boys were all stepping up from last year's Under-10s so to achieve 5th, 6th and 12th places augurs well for the future. Luca El-Labany was challenging the older riders and deserved his 5th place. Frank Spauls improved in each race and secured 6th place while Austin Brailey had some good moments.

Harley Hamill was the sole representative from Hethersett in the open event and faced two qualifying rounds against the country's top riders at Hull. He was in the thick of the action but points were hard to come by and he scored nine and six on the consecutive days.

Mason Martin was close to lifting the Junior (Under-18) title - he was leading after four races each but got little change from a difficult grid four in his final ride which relegated him to fifth overall. This put him in good stead as the only club representative on the big finals day at Astley and Tyldesley. Again he was well in contention but just outside the main contenders in the Under-16 Final and that is where he finished - another fifth place.

Hawks had 15 riders taking part in round seven of the Norfolk GO-RIDE and Senior Grand Prix series held in Eaton Park in hot conditions. There were wins for Nyla El-Labany, Oscar Copeland, Luca El-Labany and Dave Martin in their respective categories.

News From Great Melton

Steep Rise in Cost Of Grass Cutting

THIS year it has been impossible to keep on top of

grass cutting and strimming in the churchyard and we know many people have been disappointed to see it has become overgrown in places.

We have deliberately left a few areas for "wilding" as in previous seasons but this year it has been more than we hoped for.

We chased and chased for a quote from our usual contractor which we finally received at the end of March and were really shocked to find that the price per cut had more than doubled from last year.

Because of limited reserves with which to subsidise the cost, we had no option but to look at alternative contractors, but we were not left with much time to do so.

We receive an annual grant of £400 from Great Melton Parish Council which has remained unchanged in the past 20 years and used to cover about 70% of the costs of keeping the churchyard – today it covers less than 25%.

We have written on numerous occasions asking them to consider increasing but to no avail. We managed to get a quote from a new contractor which was in line with last year's charge and the plan had been am to cut initially adjacent to the church and once a

fortnight to expand the area of cut – however because it has been exceptionally wet this summer we have only been able to maintain a limited area as the grass has grown so quickly.

We feel the only option going forward is to take the maintenance back "in house" to be undertaken with volunteers.

To this end we are looking to get a shed and our own equipment before the start of next season. We will then be appealing to a workforce to meet at the churchyard once a fortnight.

On behalf of the PCC, I apologise to those who have found the state of the churchyard distressing and especially if we have not managed to cut round the graves of your loved ones but trust you will understand the predicament we find ourselves in.

In order to maintain the churchyard in pristine order we would need to receive funds of over £1000 per year unless as suggested we do it ourselves.

Please contact me if you are willing to help with strimming the long grass before winter sets in.

Great Melton Parish Council Report by chairman Bruce Fleming

GREAT Melton Parish Council met on Monday 11th September when Anita Rose was welcomed to her first meeting as the new clerk.

Aside from various matters of procedural and regulatory nature relating to the administration of the parish council. councillors received information regarding the 'Mindful Towns and Villages' scheme, supported by South Norfolk and Broadland District Councils, in partnership with Norfolk and Suffolk Foundation Trust Wellbeing Service – an opportunity for members of the community or organisations, such as religious groups, sports and social clubs, to receive free training in mental health and serve as Wellbeing Champions, with the skills to recognise mental health issues and provide low level support or facilitate access to a specialist mental health support worker. Further information is available at:

A further district council scheme, the 'Pride in Place Community Fund,' was also brought to the council's attention. This provides an opportunity to apply for funding for the improvement or development of community facilities, or for feasibility studies to be undertaken in relation to proposed projects. Grants are available to cover 50% of the total cost of a capital project, up to £25,000. Projects which have secured funding in previous rounds of the scheme include the installation of solar panels at a community pavilion, repair of a community facility roof, the repair and refurbishment of existing allotments and a feasibility study to determine the long-term viability of a multisports facility. Round three of the scheme opens for applications in November, with assessment of applications in February 2024. The total funding available for South

The dedicated work of the Great Melton History Group and its collation of the service records of those Great Melton residents who had served in World War One, was acknowledged. Discussion centred on the appropriate repository for such material and other artefacts of historical interest and importance in the life of Great Melton. The chairman will seek guidance from the Norfolk Record Office and liaise with the members of the History Group.

Norfolk across capital, revenue and feasibility streams, is almost £380,000 for 2024-25.

An update on the parish council's efforts to address concerns regarding the speed and discipline of traffic on the roads and lanes of Great Melton, was provided. In particular, actions arising from the meeting in August of the parish council's highways working group with the Norfolk County Council highways engineer for the area, were reviewed. This meeting had been timely, given two serious accidents at the intersection of Burdock Lane with Pockthorpe Road in the preceding fortnight, affording the opportunity for a site inspection of this hazardous junction. The poor road markings at the intersection were highlighted as requiring urgent attention.

The Parish Council lent its full support to South Norfolk Council's proposed Public Spaces Protection Order concerning vehicle-related anti-social behaviour.
