THE extraordinary meeting of Hethersett Parish Council called to sort out a number of points ahead of the official handing over of the new pavilion on Hethersett Memorial Playing Field threatened to turn into a farce on June 7th. Here Peter Steward gives his views on that meeting and the situation with regards to the pavilion.



A Feeling of Pride

TO say that I felt like bursting into tears at an extraordinary meeting of Hethersett Parish Council might be putting things rather strongly. Let's just say that I was hugely disappointed at what went on with that meeting.

Disappointed at the way bickering and points scoring had overshadowed the achievements of so many people that have turned the dream of a pavilion that the village could be proud of into reality.

A Personal View by Peter Steward

It was over a decade ago, when I was a trustee of the playing field, that three of us got together in my study to put forward a proposal for a new building to replace the antiquated and unfit for purpose pavilion on the playing field.

We knew it wasn't going to be an easy task as others had tried and failed before. But this time there was an enthusiasm and determination to see things through and determination to make things happen.

Plans were drawn up and submitted to South Norfolk Council and myself and lan Fieldhouse travelled to a meeting of the planning committee where our application was being heard.

We were proud to leave that meeting with unanimous support from councillors after we had answered a few basic questions. They were as happy with the idea as we were.

For a number of reasons the project suffered fits and starts for sometime and the cost began to rise but there was still a determination on the part of the trustees to see the matter through.

The turning point came when Hethersett Parish Council put its weight behind the project and former chairman Adrienne

Quinlan (who is pictured here) was a huge supporter. I had long left the playing field trustees due to the sheer weight of other voluntary work, but I remained a huge supporter of the project.

Working together, the parish council and the Memorial Field Trustees obtained grants including a major injection of cash from the Football Foundation. A loan was also taken out and work started on what had become an £800,000 project.

First thing was to demolish the old building and that took under a week.





Then the real work began to build a new pavilion. I felt a sense of relief and celebration. Relief that at last the project had been followed through and celebration that our village would at last have the facilities that it fully deserved.

Although no longer directly involved in and with the project I continued to report on progress on a monthly basis through Hethersett Herald and regular readers will know that we have featured photographs of the progress of the development every month since. Many of those photographs appear in this edition of Herald.

I still have a feeling of pride in what has been achieved by so many people. In the building itself, in the work of the trustees, working to a clear business plan and to a small part in the process that I played in the early days.

I dreamed of the day the building would be finished and, at times, thought that many of us wouldn't live to see the day. But on June 14th, three of the prime movers in making things happen— Adrienne Quinlan, Sarah Lawrence and Mike Stark, got together on the Memorial Field as a gesture of thanks to all the work that had been put in.

The furore at the extraordinary meeting of the council cannot and will not dilute the achievement of having this building. It is now there for everyone to see and it is up to all parties to ensure that the project continues to move forward without rancour, argument or nastiness creeping in.

I spoke out at that meeting about what I claimed was a lack of pride in the new building from those around the table. This was reported in the minutes of that meeting in the following words.

"Hethersett Pavilion is a facility that the community should be proud of. After speaking to representatives of the Hethersett Memorial Playing Field Trustees/ residents and listening to the debate/bickering this evening it would appear that the reason for the pavilion has been lost."

I went a little bit further than that suggesting that the bickering had taken the place of the civic pride that we should be feeling for having such a building. I know that not everyone has been in favour of the building—some suggesting that the money could have been spent more wisely. I do not share

this view. As Hethersett continues to grow we will need more and more facilities and this is a massive step in the right direction to provide the village with another community hub to serve sports clubs, users of the park and the wider community.

So often we hear from residents about the lack of facilities. Well here is one facility that isn't now lacking.

To me what has been achieved is a culmination of the efforts and support of so many people that genuinely have the village at the heart of everything they do.

The three people I popped out to photograph on a very warm Wednesday morning in June embody everything that is good about our village and illustrate what can be achieved by like minded people working together.

And working together is the key message I would like to impart. Yes we all have specific agendas and interests, but there are times when some of those have to take a backseat to the "greater good".

Whoever we are and whatever our thoughts and views are, we should all be immensely proud of this new building. It is up to each and everyone of us to ensure that it works—whether that be from a hiring and administrative point of view or from hiring the facilities and supporting events at the new community hub.

The organisers are very keen to refer to it as a community facility and I am more than happy to stress this point as that is exactly what it is—a 21st century building for the good of the whole community of Hethersett and further afield.

To Fence Or Not To Fence

TO fence or not to fence was one of the key questions which led to uproar at the extraordinary meeting of Hethersett Parish Council in June.

The meeting threatened to get out of control with parish clerk Annette Palmer firstly trying to exclude the chair of the Memorial Playing Field Trustees from the meeting and then asking for the police to be called.

Order was eventually restored but not before a considerable amount of arguing and bickering amongst councillors.

Putting a fence around the soakaway swale was just one of the matters discussed ahead of the official handover of keys by the builders to the parish council a few days later.

At the beginning and end of every council meeting there is an opportunity for members of the public to make comments. The public are usually excluded from speaking at other times during the meeting although councillors will often turn to a member of the public to clarify specific points if that person has expertise in a specific field.

A point in the meeting came when chair of the playing field trustees Mike Stark, who was sitting in the public gallery, felt a point needed clarifying. Mr Stark began to make that point.

The parish clerk immediately became very agitated and attempted to stop Mr Stark from making his points, firstly threatening to exclude him from the meeting and then asking for the police to be called.

The meeting soon settled down with Mr Stark staying quiet for the remainder of the meeting.

The discussion about the fence around the Swale almost resulted in deadlock with five councillors voting for the area to be enclosed by knee high fencing and five voting against.

A counter proposal not to fence the area off was met with similar deadlock and left the chairman with a casting vote. As a result it was agreed to keep the current temporary fencing in place until July 19th with a decision on any replacement being in the hands of the trustees.

At the end of the meeting it was announced that Ms Palmer has resigned as clerk to the council.

More On The Handover

ON Friday 9th June, Hethersett Parish Council completed its handover of the Hethersett Pavilion building to Hethersett Memorial Playing Field Trust.

The purpose-built sports and community building, which has been 10 years in the planning, will provide new fit for purpose sports changing rooms with showers and toilets, changing facilities for match officials, catering facilities for spectators and pavilion users, accessible toilets for spectators and pavilion users, a meeting room suitable for community use, enhanced facilities for less abled users and secure storage for grounds/meeting room equipment.

The building has been designed specifically to allow good access for pushchair and wheelchair users with all facilities on one level and a no step access to all rooms as well as the building itself. This new facility will mean that Hethersett will be able to attract top class sporting events and will support growth and retention of grassroots football activity via the resident affiliated football club Hethersett Athletic FC, as well as supporting many other sports including bowls, cricket and cycle speedway that take place at the site.

The main funding for the building was provided by a loan of £400,000 from the Public Works Loan Board and a grant award of £249,999 received from The Football Foundation. Sarah Lawrence, Chair of Hethersett Parish Council, said:

"The Parish Council is delighted to handover this much needed community

facility to the Hethersett Memorial Playing Field Trust. This new venue will help strengthen and develop sports in the community. The work of the Parish Council has been fundamental in the successful delivery of this project, from the sourcing of funding through to active support. We look forward to seeing this exciting new facility in use."

Mike Stark, Chairman of Hethersett Memorial Playing Field Trust said:

"The Trustees of Hethersett Memorial Playing Field are delighted to receive the newly completed building. The original project started 10 years ago and was rekindled four years ago when new plans were drawn up.

"Despite Covid and the huge increase in costs, we are now able to offer the residents of the village a chance to enjoy these first class facilities.

"Our thanks go to Annette Palmer, Clerk to Hethersett Parish Council, and former Parish Council Chair, Adrienne Quinlan, to Marcus Jaggard the lead builder, Alan Lamb the project manager and last, but not least, the Management Trustees, who over the years have given up much of their own free time and energy to get the project over the line. This is a once in a lifetime opportunity for the village to have the benefit of a facility to be proud of and enjoy".

Pavilion Pride for Hethersett

TEN years ago a group of Playing Field Trustees at that time started a project to replace the old pavilion, which was described by Peter Steward at the time in very unsavoury terms.

These Trustees managed to get planning permission for a replacement but this failed as they could not raise the necessary finance. Four years ago, we Trustees, again discussed the state off that building. The roof leaked, the showers did not work the drains were blocked and fed to the sewer through the back garden of a neighbour, and when players were taking a shower they could be seen from the Field by the public.

I was tasked to talk with the parish council to see if they could help with the project. I met with Adrienne Quinlan, the Chair at that time, and said that if we did not take action we would need to demolish the building and that would be the end of organised sport in the village, cricket having been lost a few years before.

She simply said we have no choice, we owe it to our community to do something. The parish council and trustees then formed a working group and we started with virtually a clean sheet of paper. Working together, the parish council and trustees, produced a management plan which was the mainstay of the proposition for funding made to the Football Foundation, who in the end came up with a quarter of a million pounds.

The parish council borrowed from the Public Works Loan Board and used some of the money that had to be set aside by the developers of Hethersett north sites. Since that meeting we have had Covid. Interviews with various people to find a project manager led to the appointment of Alan Lamb. There were discussions with concerned residents, presentations to Norfolk County Council's planning committee as huge inflation hit building material costs (20% in timber alone).

There were issues with getting drains to the main

road, and much more besides. Just like any major project that I have been involved in during my working life, there have been issues, debates, arguments and finally solutions. This one has been no different. The common cause of trustees and parish council has always been to deliver a top quality facility that meets the needs of our growing population. The common issue has always been the limits and pressures on funding.

Some readers may not be aware of the role of the Trustees. There are seven of us and all are volunteers responsible for the day to day management of the Memorial Playing Field. Hethersett Athletic Football Club looks after the maintenance of football pitches, but everything else is the trustees' responsibility. This is everything from cutting hedges and verges, litter picking and cleaning graffiti to the repair and maintenance of the playground and car park.

The welfare and safety of users is our prime concern and we are very conscious of our duty of care to all. The field is a facility for all residents of the village and we want everyone to enjoy it, but at the same time everyone needs to respect this special asset and those who also use it.

Hethersett now has a great new facility that has "no step " access for wheelchair and push chair users, a small kitchen with some cooking facilities. It should be pointed out that he trustees have no desire to run a cafe or coffee shop, we are fortunate to be well served in the community and have no intention to be a competitor in this area.

There is a large community room and also there are three separate toilets, including one with disabled access. For sports use we have two separate large shower and changing areas with two further rooms for match officials. These facilities are now of a standard to accommodate Hethersett Athletic playing in a higher league and for women's and girls team to play. There are also two external public

toilets for those, such as the seniors cricket team, who do not wish to hire any of the other facilities whilst they use the field.

Our aim is to attract parent/ toddler groups, keep fit and exercise groups and to provide a safe space for the elderly to meet We are looking to install an "audio loop" to help those with hearing difficulties. Ideally we would like a group which would be prepared to hire our facilities for whole mornings or afternoons as this would help secure a steady source of income to cover our running costs.

At the present time we are in the process of fitting out the pavilion with fire extinguishers, toilet roll holders, kitchen equipment, shelving, tagging keys etc, all the things that one has to do when buying a new home, it is time consuming but necessary.

The trustees aim to open shortly in a very low key manner, with a couple of small groups interested in hiring the main room. We need to be clear on how everything works together.

We realise there are some who will say we should know already, but working from a plan is not the same as walking around a real building and getting to understand the layout and how alarm systems, CCTV and security systems work.

Once we have had feedback from a small number of users we can then expand. If we were to fail initially, just imagine the comments on social media. Towards the end of the summer the trustees and parish council hope to hold an opening event and to show our residents the facilities we have available. The vast majority of our funding comes from the parish council and some areas such as the recent remedial work to the playground cost tens of thousands of pounds. There is more to do on the playground as the wooden structures are nearing the end of their useful life.

We will need to prepare a plan and costing for this

and put it before the council. Inevitably there will be some animated discussions as we press our case and in turn the council has to consider the wider demands on their budget. This interaction to my mind is simply the natural way business works.

We Trustees are aware of course of the financial constraints placed upon the parish council with increasing costs and the less than generous supply of funds from central government. Looking forward for the future of the new building, which we would like to name "The Hethersett Hub" ,when fully operational, will be the need for a manager to be responsible for the smooth full time running of facilities, ensuring tables and chairs are set out, the hot water boiler is switched on and the place is clean and tidy.

We wish to create a "Friends of the Field" users group, for those who want to help but have neither time or inclination to be a trustee or parish councillor, and one of our colleagues is looking to set this up in the near future. From helping with litter picking to rewriting the business plan, all skill sets are welcome.

I must take the opportunity to thank Adrienne Quinlan the former Chair of the Parish Council, Sarah Lawrence the current Chair, and Annette Palmer, Parish Clerk, for their support, patience and understanding; all the former and current trustees for their vision, hard work and precious time, the many parish councillors for their forbearance and tolerance during some very long and detailed discussions and debates.

Also I thank Alan Lamb the project manager and Marcus Jaggard the lead builder. We all together finally created a much needed facility for which the village can justifiably be proud and one that will serve many generations for years to come.


AN open air church service was held on the parish council green opposite the village short stay car park on June 25th

Safer Crossing



"After many months of discussions, preparations, consultations and design work we finally came up with a design which met all necessary standards and a bit more. The next task was to find funding for the project and several areas were investigated bearing positive feedback. However, out of the blue my colleagues in the Community and Environmental Services had an announcement from the Department of Transport Active Travel Fund asking for applications for funding for projects just such as ours and we were successful."

David Bills added: "I would like to thank all those involved in the project including the Academy, Woodside Junior School, Hethersett Parish Council and of course Norfolk County officers from several departments. Again a big thank you."



Another Closure for Village Pharmacy

BOOTS Chemists in Hethersett was once again closed on June 3rd due to staff shortages.

It is the latest closure that has affected the Hethersett Pharmacy with a regular lack of service, particularly at school holiday times.

The latest closure was announced on the door as people turned up to shop or pick up prescriptions. The notice informed customers that the shop would be closed all day and the nearest chemist was at Longwater in Costessey.

The latest closure met with a number of adverse comments on social media. These included the following.

"I'm sure they have good reason but I don't expect this from a big company like Boots."

"Such a large organisation should have resources which could be managed to provide at least a reduced service in a critical sphere."

"This is not an isolated incident. It happens there all the time and has been for months. I went the other afternoon to pick up a prescription and they had shut at 1pm. "This is very amateur really for a company whose new name should be Sick Note Boots."

Supporting People

Following the local elections in May we asked our three elected district councillors to tell us a little about themselves and what their hopes and aims are for the future. We start with this piece written for us by Kathryn Cross.

FIRSTLY I wanted to thank everyone who voted for me to be one of your district councillors in the recent local elections.

I know there is a lot of frustration and apathy around politics at the moment but at a local level it really is still possible to make important contributions and make our residents lives better and that is what I hope to do. Thank you for placing your trust in me.

I want to thank your outgoing councillors Adrian Dearnley and Phil Hardy for all the work they have done for the area and I know I have big shoes to fill. I am delighted to have David Bills, who is also your county councillor, and re-elected to district to help and guide me.

I was a town councillor in Wymondham for two years and although district work is new to me I can bring some of my experience to the table.

I have to say the support from the



officers at South Norfolk has been brilliant so far and I have attended numerous training sessions which have been both enlightening and informative.

There is a lot to learn but I take the responsibility seriously and commit to championing the Hethersett ward where I can.

I live close to the ward on the edge of Wymondham where I run a business on our farm called Centre Paws Norfolk – I know some of you are already regular visitors with your dogs!

This gives me first hand experience of the challenges of running a business and I hope that will help me make good decisions at the council to enable us to keep businesses thriving in our area and help new starters get their dreams off the ground.

I also have four children aged between 11 and 21 and I am passionate about giving young people opportunities both in education and in sport and leisure. Three of my boys play rugby and having excellent sports facilities is so important.

I am also aware that young people's mental health is often fragile, with many more struggling post-Covid and they need real support so that is also a priority of mine.

At the recent South Norfolk AGM I was made chair of the Supporting People Policy Committee so this will be an important role. We look at all housing policies, from allocation of social housing, to temporary accommodation, homes of multiple occupation, gypsies

and travellers, benefits, the Help Hub to name a few.

One of our main goals is to expand the Help Hub which currently has partner links to some 60 different services who can help residents across the district.

We will also be looking closely at our housing allocations policy to make sure we have the right criteria for each band on the register and the right people are getting priority one of My for housing.

> and growing issue and we have a duty to prevent it so we are looking at ways of providing more temporary accommodation to ensure nobody has to sleep on the streets.

MORE specific signs are needed to inform motorists that the parish council owned car park in Great Melton Close is short stay.

Hethersett Parish Council will be looking to put up signs asking motorists to limit their stays to either an hour or 30 minutes.

Councillors heard at their latest meeting that a number of motorists have been using the car park as a long stay option and this has included members of staff working in local businesses.

At the June parish council meeting it was unanimously agreed that the council should obtain quotes and seek funding for signs for the car park.

Councillor Paul Everett said the existing sign failed to state what the term short term implies. "It is confusing and ambiguous," he said.

It was also agreed to write to nearby businesses informing them that parking in the car park is strictly short term and should not be used by employees for all day parking.

Promotion Dream Thwarted

HETHERSETT Athletic men's Saturday team's dream of stepping up a league have been dashed due to a technicality and the fielding of illegal players by another team.

As reported in last month's Herald, Hethersett's hopes of stepping up to the Anglian Combination looked like becoming a reality after they finished fourth in the top division of the Central and South Norfolk League. The club had been told by the FA

that they had to finish in the league's top four to move up the football pyramid.

This they appeared to have achieved until it was found out that Brandon had played four illegal players in matches against Weasenham and UEA. The FA decided that Brandon should lose the six points from those two games with the wins being awarded to their opposition.

This meant that Weasenham leapfrogged Hethersett to leave our village side in fifth position. The decision is particularly galling after Hethersett were denied entry into the Anglian Combination for a number of years due to poor facilities. Something that has been remedied with the building of the new pavilion on the

memorial Playing Field—the irony of which is that a considerable grant for the building was given by the Football Foundatioon and it is the Football Association that is now blocking Hethersett's application.

An added irony is that rule changes



which come into effect next season will mean that teams can apply irrespective of their finishing league position. Unfortunately this new rule will not come in to help Hethersett this season, although it should pave their way for the following season...

Hethersett appealed against the decision but have been informed that it is an FA rule and cannot be relaxed. Norfolk FA Chief Executive Matt Carpenter told the club: "Whilst I have sympathy with the position that Hethersett have found themselves in at the end of the season, with the awarding of points to Wea-

senham from a fixture played late in the season meaning that they ended up leapfrogging you to finish fourth in table, it is important to clarify that the final table for the season is only decided once all matters relating to league fixtures have been dealt with. In this case, unfortunately, this meant that Hethersett finished fifth and therefore outside of the top four where they could have been promoted.

"Within the provisions of Norfolk FA Membership Rule 32, applications to join the Anglian Combination from teams that finish outside the top four of their district league are considered by our Board and teams can still potentially be promoted. As such, Hethersett's application was considered at our most recent Board meeting, but it was rejected as the Board did not feel there were any extreme circumstances in line with the relevant rule. This is consistent with other decisions this season and decisions from previous seasons."

Mr Carpenter went on to explain that this rule is now going to be relaxed: I can advise that the Membership Rule in question is likely to be amended next season to give more scope for teams finishing outside the top four to be promoted, but unfortunately that won't help you this season where the Board must work to the current wording of the Rule."

Open Day At Mosque

On Sunday 4th June, my daughters and I went along to the Hethersett Masjid and Islamic Community Centre on Henstead Road, better known as the Hethersett Mosque.

The Mosque was hosting an Open Day, which I had first heard about through an advert on Councillor Kathryn Cross' Facebook page, and later passed to me from Habib, a new Councillor on Hethersett Parish Council.

The Mosque, housed in the former Church Hall, has been in operation for around a year and has Muslims from Hethersett and surrounding areas coming together to worship daily. Muslims pray five times a day, at specific times which are determined by the position of the sun in the sky.

This means that in the summer, the gaps between prayers are longer because the days are longer. In the Hethersett Mosque, there is a screen in the corner of the room that updates





with the timings of the prayers for the day, so that you know when the next one is taking place.

On the day of the Open Day, on arriving at the Mosque, we were greeted outside by a member of the congregation who showed us where the entrance was and asked us to remove our shoes which we put up on shelves in the entrance lobby.

We then walked into the main room,

which was beautifully carpeted and filled with people smiling and eating. The congregation there asked us if we would like to help ourselves to some food – there was lots on offer, ranging from chicken pieces, to doughnuts and dates – which we did, then popped ourselves down onto some chairs arranged towards the back of the room.

It didn't take us long to launch into conversation with one of the people who attend. I got talking to Sayid, a very friendly man who lives in Eaton but comes to Hethersett to worship because it is easier to get to than other Mosques in Norwich. Sayid made us feel very welcome, and answered many of my questions about the Muslim faith. Not long after, we were approached by Rasha, who came over to ask us if we would like to see our names written in Arabic. Rasha very kindly wrote all of our names in Arabic on pieces of card (handily writing our names in English on the back so that we knew whose was whose!) and explained that in Arabic, writing goes from right to left.

Shortly after, there was a call to prayer (thankfully the girls were quiet during) which a really friendly lady called Nonna translated for us. Fifteen minutes later, we were there for Dhuhr – their noon prayer. The Muslim women left the room for Dhuhr to pray separately, but we were permitted to stay and observe at the back of the room. It was really interesting, and I was honoured to be able to watch the men pray.

After that, we chatted some more, and Rasha came over again to see if we would like to try on some headscarves. Of course we jumped at the chance!






They very kindly said that we could keep the headscarves too. I then had a

chat with Rasha who told me all about the tradition of women covering their heads, and her very personal choice to do so.

Not long after that, we had a final look round – not before plugging Hethersett Herald and the All Things Hethersett Facebook page – and I asked if I could take some photos for this article which they were more than happy for me to do. We left not long after, but not without them kindly giving us a bag containing a copy of the Qur'an translated into English, and some other reading materials.



All in all, we had a really lovely afternoon exploring the Mosque and speaking to the people who worship there. They made us feel so comfortable, and didn't seem to mind the barrage of questions I subjected them all to! They also said that if anyone missed the Open Day, you are welcome to pop in at anytime,

stressing that is a community space, available for anyone and everyone if it's open. Thank you to congregation of Hethersett Masjid & Islamic Community Centre for their hospitality and for making us feel so welcome. We'll be back!


As a result some of our lay-outs will look strange and it hasn't been possible to correct some spelling errors etc up to our usual standard. We have also had some problems with hyphenating words.

New Food Outlets For Thickthorn Despite Hethersett Objections

Hethersett Parish Council's objections to new food outlets at the proposed new Thickthorn interchange have been ignored with work planned to commence at a date in the future.

The parish council had written to South Norfolk Council stating the development—which will include KFC and Costa Restaurants would lead to the loss of agricultural land, increase litter and add extra traffic to an already congested area.

Planning officials have approved the plans however stating that environmental impacts including noise, odour and general disturbance can be satisfactorily controlled by conditions.

Permission Granted—Despite Objections

ONCE again comments made by Hethersett Parish Council have been ignored.

The latest surrounds a GPS signal antenna on a verge to the west of Baker Drive in the village.

The application features a 45 foot pole and led resident Loren Brown to take to Facebook.

"Why have Arqiva been granted planning permission to put up a 45 foot pole? I would like to know if any research has been done on the health effects on wildlife and how the electro magnetics affect a person's health.

"I am electrosensitive and they make me feel really bad. I certainly wouldn't buy a house near any pylons or poles."

Chairman of Hethersett Parish Council Sarah Lawrence explained that the parish council recommended the application should be refused:

"These are all the reasons why we refused the application at the Parish Council Planning committee. It got granted permission from higher up!."

The parish council recommended refusal on the following grounds:

The impact it would have on the green corridor.

The height of the masts which would have a visual impact on the surrounding landscape with residential properties in the immediate vicinity.

Concerns over the possible detrimental effect on public health and local biodiversity with the site on a well-used public footpath leading to a primary school.

IT has been established that certain areas in the village are not the responsibility of the parish council for grass cutting.

These areas, which include around the village sign and verges in Mill Road, will be returned to Norfolk County Council for action.

The council's finance and general purposes committee will be looking into whether the regular Heritage Plant Sale should be charged a fee for using the grounds of the village hall. The plant sale has continued to grow in popularity and currently hires the village hall but does not pay for using the outside grounds despite charging the public £2.

Council vice chairman Bridget Williamson said: "They hire the hall but the parish council doesn't get a fee for their use of the field and members of the public are excluded from using that area whilst they are there."

The council thanked its Community and Projects Officer Sara White for her outstanding work in organising the village's coronation party on land at the village hall.

"We owe a huge thank you to Sara for organising an incredible event which was enjoyed by everyone," Mrs Williamson said.

"She certainly went an extra mile or two," added Leslie Dale.

Councillors agreed that committees should be set up for any future events. Councillors agreed that an appeal for residents to leave their vehicles at home and either walk or cycle to the event had worked well.

"People were brilliant. The car park was nowhere near full. Obviously some people have to come by car but this should act as a flagship for all our events," Mrs Williamson said.

The council has received a number of e-mails about speeding, road safety and inconsiderate parking in the village and will discuss all aspects of this at its July meeting.


The theme this year was 'Stage and Screen' with the scarecrows all based on that. Scarecrows ranged from Star Wars, to the Lego Movie and Minions.

The next meeting of Great Melton Parish Council will be held on Monday 11th September at 7.30 pm in the Village Hall, Hall Road, Great Melton.



Changes To Library Service in Little Melton

Changes are being made to the mobile library service in Little Melton as Rebecca Heaser explains.

The changes follow the public consultation last year and the final decisions made by Norfolk County Council Cabinet in January 2023. One mobile library will be decommissioned. The county council will continue to operate five vehicles, and an electric mini mobile, due for commission later this year. In accordance with the key principles agreed by members, Norfolk Library and Information Service will cease the majority of stops that happen within 1.5 miles of a branch library.

They will be working with customers to ensure they know what is happening. Anyone unable to visit a branch library will be able to contact their local library and request a visit from the Home Library Service (HLS) that they operate in partnership with the Royal Voluntary Services (RVS).

Every route and stop has now been reviewed and, whilst they have tried to minimise disruption, it does mean that in a number of cases the day and time which the mobile library visits has had to change. This is to ensure best use of the mobile library resource for as many people and communities as possible.

From Monday 3rd July the only stop in Little Melton will be on Thursdays at 5 pm at School Lane outside no 93/95 with a postcode of NR9 3LA.

The new dates for 2023 are: July 13th, August 10th, September 7th, October 5th, November 2nd, November 30th and December 28th.







More About The Lords of Hethersett

The Manor of Hethersett Cromwells (1360-present day)

FROM 1360 the main manor in Hethersett was known as the "Manor of Hethersett Cromwells." It was also sometimes referred to as "Hethersett with the Members" to reflect the subsidiary lands that were part of it in other parts of Norfolk.

Although it had followed a circuitous route, Hethersett was still held by increasingly distant members of the same family that took hold of it not long before the time of Domesday.

By 1360 it had travelled from the family of the Lords of Middleham, to the Tateshales, and then to the Bernaks. In that year Maud de Bernak - the last of that family to hold the manor - was Lady of Hethersett. Although she was no longer known as a Bernak, having married Ralph de Cromwell.

The Cromwell family were incredibly wealthy and powerful. As such, they were far removed from the day to day running of their manors. In order to keep the King's hands off their property and to avoid paying upon inheritance, they would often enfeof - or place in trust - their properties.

Where known I have added in the feoffees (trustees).

1360-1398

Ralph de Cromwell, 1st Lord Cromwell

Held by right of his wife **Maud de Bernak**, the elder sister of both John and William, and last surviving child of John and Joan de Bernak. He acquired his main seat at Tateshale through his marriage to Maud.

1398-1417

Ralph, 2nd Lord Cromwell

Inherited upon the death of his Father, by right of his mother Maud, who was still living.

1417-1456

Ralph, 3rd Lord Cromwell

Inherited upon the Death of his Father, by Right of his Grandmother Maud, who lived until 1419.

Treasurer of England. Ralph died without issue, and asked his executors to sell all his property not otherwise entailed and use the money for whatever they wished. Some was sold, but some was kept. One of his Feoffees, Bishop William Waynfleet, used the funds to found Magdalen College at Oxford.

Feoffees c1424-1429

Sir John Tiptoft, knt, Sir William Phelep, knt, William Paston Esq, Oliver Groos

All had died by 1454 and were perhaps nominally the

feoffees until this time, when new feoffees were chosen.

Feoffees 1454 -1486

William Waynfleet, Bishop of Winchester, and 27 more, including John Ratcliffe

Waynfleet was definitely a feoffee of Hethersett. The others were likely also the same, all of Cromwell's lands being enfeoffed at the same time.

1456-1483

Maud Willoughby (nee Stanhope)

Maud was the cousin of Ralph, and heir to her mother **Maud Stanhope (nee Cromwell)**, Ralph Cromwell's sister.

She was married three times - to Sir Robert Willoughby, Sir Thomas Neville, and Sir Gervase Clifton, yet died without

any issue. A skirmish when her bridal party was attacked after her marriage to Sir Thomas Neville is often described as the spark that began the War of the Roses with the Battle of St Albans in 1455.

1483-1497

Sir Robert Radcliffe

Maud gave the Manor of Hethersett to Sir Robert as a Gift for the term of his life.

He was her brother in law, being the second husband of her sister Joan. He was living in Hethersett at the time a Tax was taken in 1498. The Baillif of Hethersett Manor at this time was William Flowerdewe.

Feoffee 1486 - c1500

Juliana Churchstyle

The first cousin and heir of William Waynfleet, Bishop of Winchester. He had been the last surviving of the Feoffees appointed in 1454, and so his heir inherited the enfeoffment.

1497-1497

Maud Willoughby (nee Stanhope)

As her gift to Sir Robert was only for life, the manor returned to Maud when he died in February 1497. She only held it for 6 months, dying in August. Maud is pictured below.

1497-c1500

Robert Broughton

Broughton convinced the feoffee, Juliana, that he was Maud's next heir, being descended via a tortuous route from William de Bernak, who died a minor in 1360. He probably believed this to be the truth, however he was actually descended from a William from another branch of the Bernak family, who never had an interest in Hethersett.

The Cromwell Legacy

After the Death of Maud, the line of succession fell into doubt.

Robert Broughton had convinced Juliana, the feoffee, that he was the next heir, and she refused to release possession of Hethersett Manor to the other claimants until compelled by a Suit in Chancery.

The court case took place in about 1500, brought by Sir William Knyvet, aged 60, whose great grandmother was Elizabeth, a sister of Ralph, the 2nd Lord Cromwell, and by William Fitzwilliam, aged 13, whose 3x Great Grandmother was Maud, the other sister of the same Ralph.

The two William's - Knyvett and Fitzwilliam were successful - and the manor was held jointly by them.



In the terms of the time, they each held a "Moiety" of the manor. This meant they held it equally but undivided. All decisions - such as who would be the next Rector of Hethersett - were to be agreed by both, and the profits would be split equally.

c1500-1516 -Knyvett's Moiety Sir William Knyvitt

Inherited by descent from Elizabeth Cromwell after a court action.

c1500-c1510 -FitzWilliam's Moiety William FitzWilliam

Inherited by descent from Maud Cromwell after a court action.

In a strange twist,



William Waynfleet, Bishop of Winchester (died 1486)

William was married to Margery, the daughter of Sir Robert Broughton, who had earlier claimed ownership of Hethersett Manor by a faulty descent from the wrong Bernaks.

William and Margery died childless.

c1510-

1536 -



Sir William FitzWilliam (died 1515)

FitzWilliam's Moiety

Sir Robert Drury (pictured below)

Around 1510 William FitzWilliam signed his moiety of the manor away to Robert Drury for the term of his life, for £20 a year.

The Drurys were linked with the family by marriage. After the death of Joan Stanhope (the sister of Maud Willoughby/Stanhope), Robert Radcliffe married Katherine le Strange, Drury's sister.

By the terms of the sale, after Drury's death the Manor was to go to the heirs of FitzWilliam's body. In the case that FitzWilliam had no children (which he did not) it was to go to John Broughton (the son of Robert Broughton), George Waldegrave (Drury's son in law), and William Drury Esq (Robert's eldest son).



Second son of Sir Robert, Hethersett was to have gone to his elder brother William, but it seems that plans changed. Broughton and Waldegrave - the other two who had stood to share in the inheritance - had died by this date.

In 1546 Robert sold his moiety of the Manor to John Flowerdewe.

1516-1550 - Knyvett's Moiety

Edmund Knyvitt

Edmund inherited as Great Grandson of Sir William Knyvett. His father and grandfather had each died at sea before his Great Grandfather's death. Edmund and his





wife Anne sold 5 houses and about 200 acres of land in Hethersett to John Flowerdewe in 1545, and their half of the Manor 5 years later.

1541-1565 - FitzWilliam's Moiety

John Flowerdewe

At the time of purchase, Flowerdewe was the Bailif of the Manor of Hethersett. He had perhaps been so for some time, a William Flowerdewe having been bailiff during the time of Robert Radcliffe's lordship in the 1490s.

This John Flowerdewe was the notorious Mr Flowerdewe of Kett's Rebellion fame. The Rebellion itself occurred in 1549.

In 1557, to secure his eldest son William's marriage to Frances Appleyard, John made a contract whereby his son William and Frances would have Fitzwilliam's moiety after John's death. It was then to go to their children. If there were none, to each of John's sons in order.

1550-1560 - Knyvett's Moiety

Thomas Knyvitt

Thomas inherited the Manor from his father. Unfortunately he inherited £1300 of debt as well.

1560-1565 - Knyvett's Moiety

John Flowerdewe

John was bailiff not only of Hethersett Manor, but also of other Manors held by the Knyvetts.

In 1560 he bought Thomas's share of the manor for £610. Thomas's mother still held the Manor for life, as part of the marriage agreement she had originally made with Edmund, Thomas's father. After her Death it would be placed in the hands of Flowerdewe, instead of Drury. She was then married to Christopher Coote, and died in 1563.

John Flowerdewe - Lord of the Manor of Hethersett

In 1560 John Flowerdewe held both moieties of the Manor of Hethersett and was the undoubted Lord of Hethersett. With a brief hiatus, his family would hold the manor for the next two centuries.

The line of familial descent from the time of the Domesday Book was now broken. The relatives of Ribald of Middleham had held Hethersett for 485 years.

The photograph at the top of this page is the historic Kett's Oak.

Notra Dame de Lorette

Historian and Hethersett Herald columnist John Head looks back on his visit to a very moving war memorial in France.

One of the most moving war memorials
I have visited is the 'Ring of
Remembrance' which appropriately
abuts the largest French military
cemetery in the world of Notre Dame
de Lorette. It is situated north west of

Arras at the village of Ablain-Saint-Nazaire.

The military cemetery and its ossuaries contain the remains of more than 40,000 French soldiers and its location is significant as it is in an area of several strategic battles in World War 1, especially the Battles of Artois.

In the grounds of the cemetery is the beautiful Notre Dame de Lorette Basilica together with the Lantern Tower which is a reminiscence of the medieval Lantern of the Dead.


The photograph on the previous page and at the top of this page show the Basilica.



The centre picture on this page is of the Lantern Tower and the bottom picyure shows the war graves.

It is not surprising that this location was chosen for the building of the Ring of Remembrance as it commemorates all those soldiers who died in that region of conflict during World War 1, including French, German and British. It therefore also commemorates the unification of former enemies.

The memorial is inscribed with over 600,000 names listed in alpha order regardless of nationality, creed or rank. It was inaugurated on 11th November 2014 the shape being described as one to brotherhood and an expression to peace.



One of the names on the memorial is





that of my Great Uncle, Serjeant George Head of the Royal Garrison Artillery who fell on the first day of the German Spring Offensive (operation Michael) on 21th March 1918.

The photographs on this page show what is now a very peaceful

scene but which hasn't always been. The top picture is looking from the Ring of Remembrance to Vimy Ridge and below that is an image looking from the Ring of Remembrance to St Eloi.

Over the page is a gallery and this is followed by John's discover of a number of people with the surname Head who are remembered.

This is a place worthy of visiting for remembrance abd quiet reflection and the photographs end with a panoramic view of the Ring of Remembrance at Notre Dame De Lorette.


