The Great Escape

HETHERSETT and Tas Valley Cricket Club has completed the great escape to prevent relegation from the top tier of local cricket.

Defeat to Brooke in early August left Valley rock bottom of the Premier Division of the Norfolk Alliance in the club's first season in the top flight.

But a welcome and perhaps slightly unexpected victory at Bradfield in the penultimate match of the league season lifted Valley off the bottom and set-up a relegation showdown in the final match at home to Cromer.

By this time a number of other clubs had been pulled into the relegation dogfight and Valley knew that victory over the Seasiders would see them safe and turn what could have been a disappointing season into a successful one, bearing in mind the number of young players that have represented the club this season.

As it turned out Valley had to battle both Cromer and the weather but their best bolwing performance of the year combined with an almost faultless batting display saw them home by nine wickets and a few minutes ahead of heavy rain.

The maximum haul of 25 points lifted Hethersett up to sixth place—the highest league finish in the club's history.

There has been plenty of other success for the club this season with a hugely successful women's and youth setup and you can read about this by turning to page six with a full report of the match against Cromer on page seven of this edition of Hethersett Herald.

New Retail Bus Service For Village

HETHERSETT has another new bus service. This latest addition to village facilities will see the number 806 operating between Hethersett and Longwater Retail Park at Costessey on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays with one bus making a return journey.

The service starts on 4th September and will be operated by One Bus and funded by Norfolk County Council.

There will be an extensive route through Hethersett taking in New Road, Mill Road, Great Melton Road, Queen's Road, Norwich Road, Churchfields, Baker Drive, Coachmaker Way, Harness Maker Way and Burnthouse Lane.

The retail park has a number of outlets including Sainsburys, The Range, Aldi, Next, Boots, Smyths Toys, M and S Food, Sports Direct, Food Warehouse, Pizza Hut, McDonalds, Costa Coffee and Greggs. The service will give just over one and a half hours before the return journey. Timings are below

Coping With Mental Health Problems

HETHERSETT and Tas Valley Cricket Club is supporting a new initiative designed to safeguard the mental health of cricketers.

"Opening Up Cricket" is a new initiative as you can read opposite. After the presentation at the Tas Valley clubhouse in Flordon, club chairman Matt Bird said that the Hethersett club is determined to learn some of the coping mechanisms for mental health support.

"This is just the start for us and we are committed to supporting the wellbeing of all our members and the cricket community in general," he said.

What Is Opening Up Cricket?

Opening Up Cricket was formed in 2014 in response to the death of Sefton Park Cricket Club wicketkeeper Alex Miller and a will to promote positive mental health in the sport.

Alex took his own life in December 2012 and, in the year that followed, team mates supported the work of the Campaign against Living Miserably (CALM) to pay tribute. This has continued but, as the season following his passing came to a close, there was a thought to do something lasting and further reaching.

As a result, the Opening Up Cricket organisation was created with the aim of speaking to cricketers and clubs about the experience of loss and to help prevent further tragedies.

This year Opening Up Cricket has delivered over 400 sessions across the United Kingdom and Australia.

One of these was recently undertaken at Hethersett and Tas Valley Cricket Club.

Hethersett Beat Cromer and the Weather

HETHERSETT and Tas Valley's whole season hung on the final league game in the Premier Division of the Norfolk Alliance.

Valley knew that a win would ensure Premier Division survival, but they had not only to beat their opponents but also the weather.

They were helped in their endeavours by the most potent bowling performance of the season which saw Cromer humbled to an all out total of just 109 with Crispin Clarke taking 4-35. The total would have been much lower if opener Nathaniel Laws had not hit 55—over half of his side's total.

It was more likely that the threatened rain, which saw the ground at Flordon change from one bathed in sunshine to one threatened by the elements, would hamper their efforts but the short amount of time they took to bowl out the Seasiders certainly helped and the batters made short work of reaching their target despite losing opener Joseph Wilson with just seven runs on the board.

Jed Mockford hit an unbeaten 57 and Ian Bryce

was not out 30 as the duo put on 103 for the second wicket to guide Hethersett to victory.

Throughout the game, Hethersett played with huge enthusiasm, taking some spectacular catches.

With other results also going their way, Valley were lifted up to sixth place in the division and 34 points clear of the relegation zone. Top six final positions were:

One of Tony's plays is entitled "Karl's Finest Hour" and it will have its world premier at the sponsored eight hour plus reading.


Tony's plays will range from the short light-hearted to the more poignant and serious and feature a whole cast of characters.

A steadying team talk saw the Hawks maintain that advantage to the end. Star turn was Jamie Neill who, in his comeback season, is hitting peak form with three heat wins.

Cue shopping for her new uniform over the first few weeks of the summer holidays and I think we're almost ready for her to start her next journey into the world of high school.

This month we have waved bon voyage to our amazing and inspirational friend, Samantha England and her husband Mike, who are emigrating to Australia. I've written before about how much I look up to Sam, and the difference she has made to Hethersett and beyond, especially since the pandemic. Sam and Mike head up the Hethersett Hearts Community Group, which, along with an army of volunteers, help the elderly, refugees and anyone experiencing difficulties. 



"The day was a lot of fun, residents were able to pet certain animals which was quite therapeutic and we had great weather for the outing."







Our Village 2023

HETHERSETT is still some way off from having a new rector, but work is going on behind the scenes to produce a parish profile to attract quality applicants.

As part of that process I recently wandered round the village to take photographs of various areas and buildings and over the next couple of editions of Hethersett Herald will share a few of these with you—Peter Steward.







Two more churches—the modern looking Methodist Church in Great Melton Road and the Baptist Church just around the corner in Henstead Road





On the left is the former Parish Church Hall in Henstead Road which is now a mosque and on the right Hethersett Queen's Head which dates back to the 17th Century.





Hethersett Library which has just celebrated its golden anniversary and next to that is the new Memorial Field pavilion which brings village building slap bang up to date and which was opened this year.

Featured Building of the Month



HETHERSETT Church of England Voluntary Controlled Primary School has gone through a number of name changes over the years including Hethersett National School, Hethersett Middle School and Hethersett Junior School.

Formal paid for and non-compulsory education began in the village in 1817. The first school building went up in the year that Venezuela became an independent country and James Munroe was inaugurated as the fifth president of the United States of America, the year that novelist Jane Austin died and John Constable painted Flatford Mill and the year in which there were riots in Derbyshire by workers over low pay and Waterloo Bridge was opened in London.

The first National School building in Hethersett was situated just across from the present Primary School in Queen's Road. The original building was demolished in 1980 and today the site is a private bungalow, but in the front garden is a commemorative plaque.

In 1860 the Rector of Hethersett, the Rev. William Collett, applied to the National Society for aid towards erecting a new mixed school measuring 53ft by 18ft to accommodate 120 children, with a teacher's house attached. The site, valued at £92. 10s was taken from glebe land and the cost of the new schoolroom and proposed teacher's house amounted to £751 15s 6d. A government grant of £280 4s was received and £44 11s 6d was raised locally. Other substantial grants included £30 from the National Society.

The new school was completed in 1861 and the original building was retained as an infants department.







The Two Helmets

Historian and Herald columnist John Head is also a member of the Le Paradis Commemoration Group. The group was set up to honour the memory of 97 men who died in a massacre in Northern France in 1940. Two soldiers survived the massacre. Here John tells just part of the story of the Massacre at Le Paradis and explains how an important find has led to the repatriation of a priceless artifact from that fateful day over 83 years ago.

LATE in the afternoon of 27th May, 1940, 99 soldiers from the 2nd Battalion Royal Norfolk Regiment, the 1st Battalion Royal Scots Regiment and other units of the BEF (British Expeditionary Force) surrendered to the enemy in the French hamlet of Le Paradis.

They were marched across a field where they were divested of parts of their uniforms and, in many cases, their dogtags (identification tags). They finally crossed a road and by the wall of a barn owned by Louis Creton they were massacred. This atrocity was carried out by the 3rd Company 1st Battalion 2nd SS Totenkopf Rifle Regiment under the orders of SS-Haupsturmführer Fritz

Knoechlein on the day of his 29th birthday. Only two soldiers survived, Privates. Bill O'Callaghan and Bert Pooley.

The ending of the Second World War saw many pilgrimages to Le Paradis, initially led by the Dunkirk Veterans Association, to commemorate those who paid the ultimate sacrifice on that fateful day.

Together with the residents of Le Paradis and the town of Lestrem, poignant annual services of remembrance are held at 'Louis Creton's Barn' and at the Commonwealth War Grave Cemetery to the rear of the church at Le Paradis where, following exhumation at the barn in May 1942, 'our boys' were finally laid to rest.

Sadly only 49 soldiers of the 97 scythed down were identified, 44 being from the Royal Norfolk Regiment. The rest are buried in 'unknown' graves in the cemetery at Le Paradis with their names being included on the Dunkirk Memorial to the Missing.

On 26th February, 2023, I received a message from Jean -Charles Dufour, the owner of 'Louis Creton's Barn', stating that he had discovered two 'English' helmets whilst clearing the barn pending sale. These were kindly offered to me as a gift. Jean-Charles also attached a photograph of the helmets which you can view on the next page.





The top picture shows the round-up of the Royal Norfolks after the surrender and below that is the aftermath of the massacre.

I notified the other members of our Le Paradis Commemoration Group comprising of Dennis O'Callaghan (son of Bill O'Callaghan one of the two survivors of the massacre), Nick Smith (historian and photographer) and Peter Steward (the editor of this emagazine and owner/web-site architect of Hell in Paradise which can be viewed at www.leparadismassacre.com. A photograph of the helmets was immediately forwarded to Neil R Storey, renowned local historian and author, for formal identification as these could have been helmets from the First World War as the same ground was fought over in the two wars.

Neil quickly came back with the answer as follows thanks to his vigilant eyes;

"I am delighted to be able to confirm the helmets will certainly be those of British soldiers present at Le Paradis in 1940. The British Army had stocks of WW1 period 'Brodie' helmets that they refitted with new liners in 1938/39. It would be easy to say these are WW1 helmets because in effect they are BUT they are refitted AND if you look where I have ringed in red you will see the fittings that held the chin straps have 1938/1939 dates."

However, it still needed to be established whether these helmets belonged to the Royal Norfolk Regiment especially two of those 99 soldiers who entered the 'killing field' at Le Paradis.

Meanwhile our group decided that in order to further the bond between us and Le Paradis, one helmet would be donated to the small museum in Le Paradis (pictured at the bottom of this page) where it has now been agreed to be housed in a glass display case. The other helmet to be displayed in an appropriate place in Norfolk which is still under discussion.

With the barn 'up for sale' there was now concern how we could retrieve our selected helmet at the earliest as our next pilgrimage to Le Paradis is not due until May 2024.

By a remarkable piece of luck Peter Steward had been informed by one of his 'bloggettes,' Biddy Fisher, that she would be visiting France, together with her family, in June 2023 to pay their respects at a family grave located at Beaumont Hamel. Biddy kindly agreed to make a detour to visit Jean-Charles to obtain the helmet on our behalf.

Behind the scenes our group worked to co-ordinate the success of the meet up between Biddy and Jean-Charles. Stéphane Gomane, the Deputy Mayor of Lestrem and the annual Le Paradis Commemoration Co-ordinator, ensured Biddy had access to the small museum in Le Paradis and Jean-Charles agreed to open his field for Biddy and her family to pay their respects at the barn where the massacre occurred.

On 20th June, I was visiting Harewood House in the heart of Yorkshire when I received a phone call from Biddy stating she had safely received the helmet and also confirming that she had undergone a very emotional experience with her family whilst at Le Paradis. Biddy

sent through photos of the helmet where it was noticed there was a small yellow oblong on the side of it. Again, this was forwarded to Neil Storey for his comments.

After a short while Neil responded as follows;

"I suspect the yellow oblong once had a black up the centre of it before the years took their toll. I have a 1940 helmet in my collection with the same decal. It is an allusion to the old puggaree flash the Officers and men of the Norfolk Regiment wore on their pith helmets - yellow for

the yellow facings of the regiment, the black line as ever in mourning for Sir John Moore, who the drummers of the 9th Foot buried at Corunna".

The 9th Foot evolved into the Royal Norfolk Regiment and you can read about the burial of Sir John Moore in the poem 'The Burial of Sir John Moore After Corunna (1817) 'by Charles Wolfe.

Thanks to Neil we had now established the helmets belonged to soldiers of the Royal Norfolk Regiment. We finally needed to establish whether these helmets were on (or close to) the wooden crosses on the temporary graves in front of the barn prior to exhumation.

I again referred to Jean-Charles for more historic research through previous owners of the barn and on 17th July I received the message that our group was hoping for;

Dear John,

These helmets have found their place, and so much the better!

Yes, they were certainly among the wooden crosses on the temporary graves.

The farm and the barn have been sold.

The new owners are young people in their thirties and they are aware of what happened and have agreed to welcome you to the next commemoration.


