Overcoming Health Hurdles

"The most

Joint Statement

A NEW medical centre for Hethersett remains on the agenda as we enter 2023 with interested parties stating that the most significant hurdles have been cleared

Just before Christmas, a joint statement was issued by South Norfolk Council. NHS Norfolk and Wavenev Integrated Care Board (ICB), and the Humbleyard Practice stating that the partners were "still exploring options to provide additional healthcare" in the area which would include a new health centre in Hethersett.

The full text of the statement is as follows:

"The NHS Norfolk and Waveney Integrated Care Board (ICB), the organisation which commissions services provided by GP practices, South Norfolk Council, and the Humbleyard Practice are continuing to engage with local partners to explore options that will provide additional healthcare and medical provision within the Hethersett area.

"The ICB, Humbleyard Practice, and South Norfolk Council, are all committed to improving the healthcare facilities in the Humbleyard catchment area. All three parties are working together to scope a project which, if delivered, would likely see a new build surgery in Hethersett, involving the relocation from existing premises into larger facilities.

"This potential investment will support the delivery of sustainable, excellent patient care for the future, provide an expanded range of clinical services, and also offer a new healthcare provision for local residents.

"Currently, the Humbleyard Practice, which serves Cringleford, Hethersett and Mulbarton, has a registered

> patient list of more than 21.750 patients across its three existing sites. It is acknowledged that the practice is already oversubscribed and is working with the ICB to ensure it has the premises and workforce to serve the current patient list and

meet the future demand of the proposed 1,700 - 2,000 homes still to be built in its catchment area.

"While the project will need all the parties to work together, South Norfolk Council is proactively working with all partners to secure an appropriate serviced location in Hethersett together with the necessary finance to construct a GP practice.

"Detailed planning permission and commercial discussions will be required but the most significant hurdles have been cleared. The partners will be engaging with the local community as the project develops to ensure that the needs and views of the community are considered in the proposals."

Back in April we broke the story of a new health centre taking a giant step forward with the following words:

Hethersett's efforts to have a new health centre and surgery have taken a major step forward with the announcement of a £4 million shot in the arm

"South Norfolk Council has voted to set aside £4 million in its budget for the next five years with the money being made available in one chunk in the coming financial year.

"In addition, developers Taylor Wimpey are making a parcel of land available along with a six figure sum to support any project further. The NHS Commissioning Group has agreed to pay the rent on the building for the next five years.

"District Councillor Phil Hardy told the latest meeting of Hethersett Parish Council that negotiations were underway and interested parties were "sitting around a table and talking."

HETHERSETT Memorial Playing Field Bowls Club has appealed for residents to help them fight vandalism.

The club which has a green and clubhouse at the back of the park and close to the cycle speedway track has suffered three breakins over the past few weeks.

Very little has been stolen and David Smith from the club has appealed for help in ensuring that what he believes is more vandalism than burglary stops. He has appealed for anyone seeing anything suspicious to report it to the police and the club has been in touch with local community policing officer PC Stu Barnard.

Locks on the clubhouse door have been broken and a few beers stolen but ultimately Mr Smith believes that a group of youths are responsible.

"This is very disappointing as the club doesn't have a great deal of money and this kind of thing is a drain on our resources," Mr Smith said.





Memories of the Past For Colin

THE pre Christmas craft fair at Hethersett VC Primary School brought the memories flooding back for one of the stallholders. Colin Wilson takes up the story.

"Joy and I moved from Pakefield near Lowestoft, to Hethersett in the summer of 1984 and I joined the Hethersett Middle School PTA. About the same time I agreed to join as treasurer and did it for several years.

"I had an idea that starting a craft fair similar to one they had at Pakefield might be a good fundraiser for the PTA and we (the PTA) made plans for our first one to be in the following year 1985 and as far as I am aware, the Hethersett Middle School Christmas Craft Fair first started that year.

"I'm not sure how many years it ran for but I also have a photo of our stall cc.1990, but I think it ran longer than that or may even have never stopped.

"Rod was the PTA chairman at the time and Liz Hovey a bit later. Mr. Jones was the school headmaster. They were enjoyable times and fondly remembered.

"Other PTA fundraising events included the summer fete and car boot, Artificial ice skating, and the Turkey Supper. I feel there were other events but can't remember what they were."

Colin's photos show himself and his wife Joy, Joy's mother, and Colin and Joy's son and daughter Jonathan and Claire. The up to date photo taken this

December includes Claire's daughter (Colin and Joy's granddaughter).

"It's interesting that four generations are depicted at the same event at different times -Joy's mum, Joy, Joy's daughter

Claire, and Joy's granddaughter Daisy and of course, me," Colin said.

EDITOR'S NOTE:

"I joined the PTA at the school after Colin but remember my time as vicechairman with great affection.

"I particularly remember the summer fete with the legendary gunge tank that resembled a mobile toilet, the craft fair which continued for many years and which saw every classroom filled with Christmas goods and, of course, the turkey supper.

"The turkey supper was exactly what it says—a turkey meal which was followed by a disco. This event was always over subscribed with a waiting list in case people dropped out. People booked immediately for the following year.

"I served my legendary Christmas punch/mulled wine, using a secret recipe which in reality was just chucking in anything I could get my hands on. Red wine, orange juice, apple juice, lemonade and herbs all got chucked in, heated up and then served. I suspect that by the time it got to the mulled wine everyone had had enough to drink to not worry about what the ingredients were.

"After being on the PTA for a number of years, I became a governor at the school and was chair of governors for a number of years."

"It was wonderful before Christmas this year to be able to renew acquaintances



with a craft fair which for so many years had been a highlight of the school calendar.

"One other social event I remember vividly was spending the last night of the millennium at the school and ensuring that I stayed sober as I was due to be at work at 11pm. As the revellers at the school saw in the new millennium I sat on my own in an office waiting to see whether an anticipated international virus affected computers. It didn't and about 3 am I made my way home again.

"I will always remember with great affection my involvement with what was Hethersett VC Middle School and which subsequently became Hethersett VC Junior School and which now is Hethersett VC Primary School.

"I enjoyed returning this year to have a look round the new teaching block and look back on what was a good time in my life."

Incidentally Colin is a very accomplished artist whose paintings we featured in Hethersett Herald during lockdown.

Colin is also responsible for the backdrop scenery at the annual Hethersett village pantomime and you can read more about that in this edition of your magazine.

Adele has sung in St Remigius Church choir for over 25 years and has been an integral part of the flower arranging team at the church, being a leading light in a number of highly colourful flower festivals. This included organising the flower festival to celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee earlier this year.

In the past she has been on the Church Hall Committee and was wardrobe mistress for Hethersett Pantomime Group for 10 years.

Outside of the village, Adele has been a committee member of Costessey Flower Club for over 25 years and chair for 15 years..

Adele volunteered at Priscilla Bacon Lodge until Covid struck and she worked for R. J. Bartram Funeral Directors as a funeral arranger for five years when they had an office in

Tax On The Rise

HETHERSETT Parish Council is to increase its part of Council tax by

37.7% for the 2023/2024 financial year.

A budget of £230,000 has been set, an increase of almost £60,000 on the previous year's figure of £170,597. This means the parish part of the council tax will see a Band D property go up from £65.18 to £84.56 or an additional £19.38 a year.

At its latest meeting, councillors agreed on the new budget with seven voting for and three abstaining with four councillors absent.

Chairman Adrienne Quinlan pointed out that it was the first effective rise for

three years and represented an increase of less than the price of a cup of coffee a month for a Band D property.

"We need to keep the cost as low as possible but we have certain commitments to the village," she said.

Councillor Eileen Mulvaney queried the cost of grass cutting in the village which

now takes over £2,000 a year.

The council agreed to look into this matter as part of financial discussions in the coming year.

Parish Shorts

A new commemorative tree has been planted on the Memorial Playing Field to replace the original tree which failed to take. The tree was originally planted to mark the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.

The council still has Platinum Jubilee mugs for sale. Nineteen of the 32 mugs have been sold and the council will advertise the remainder in the run up to Christmas

The council is obtaining quotes for the painting of the World War Two Memorial Bench in the village centre and also the railings around Kett's Oak off the B1172.

Meeting Dates

Full council dates for 2023 are: January 30th, February 20th, March 20th, April 17th, May 15th, June 19th, July 17th, August (no meeting), September 18th, October 16th, November 20th, December 18th. The annual parish meeting will be held on April 19th.

The council meets monthly usually on the third Monday of each month except for August when there is no meeting. Please note that the January 2023 meeting will be on the fourth Monday due to the village pantomime taking place in the village hall. Council meetings begin at 7.30 pm. New Community and Projects Officer Appointed



A Matter Of Life and Death

KNOWING the location of the nearest defibrillator could be a matter of life and death



It is housed in a yellow case. We have also purchased a set of paediatric electrode pads which can be found inside.

Are Falling Leaves Just A Nuisance?

The quick answer to this is 'No!'.

Green Issues

Fallen leaves provide wildlife, especially pollinators, with some winter cover. Bees,

moths, butterflies, snails, spiders, and dozens of arthropods and pollinators overwinter in dead plant material for protection from cold weather and predators, so if you can, do consider creating a leaf pile or two and allow it to break down naturally.

The resulting mulch can then be spread on your flower and vegetable beds, as leaves are an amazing organic matter, and are a rich source of calcium, magnesium, phosphorous and potassium; they also feed earthworms and beneficial microbes.

You can also rake your leaves on to your flower or vegetable beds (you can chop or shred them first if you like), leaving space around the stems of growing plants to avoid crown rot.

You can pile the leaves up to 10cm deep to make a cosy winter blanket for your plants' roots. I doubt any leaves you have are dried out, considering the rain we have had, but if they are, you can run over them with a lawn mower before spreading them.

Leaves also make a good insulating layer for cold-hardy vegetables and root crops stored in the ground, such as carrots, kale and leeks. They are also very good at insulating tender plants from the cold.

Ignore the leaves on your lawn – continue mowing your lawn as usual, until both leaf fall and grass growth have ended for the year. Leaf and lawn clippings will both break down quickly in the lawn, feeding the soil for next year. Just don't leave thick layers of matted leaves on your lawn, as this blocks oxygen to the soil and invites disease.

Please don't sweep or blow leaves in the streets, as they will clog up the drains. Please do rake or blow leaves under hedges, as they create a wonderful winter habitat for wildlife.

Leaves are also perfect for your compost heap, as they are a fabulous source of carbon to balance the nitrogen in your compost.

So don't be a perfectionist! Leave leaf litter to feed worms, fungi and soil bacteria, as well as sheltering our precious wildlife and insect population.

Opposition to Planned Thickthorn Extension

HETHERSETT Parish Council is opposing extensions to the existing park and ride at Thickthorn.

Proposals are to increase the size of the park and ride to give additional car and coach parking, more disabled and motorcycle spaces, bus shelters, cycle storage and Amazon hub facility and drainage work.

But the council's planning committee believe that the extension would be constructed on land within the Hethersett/Cringleford Strategic gap which would set a precedent for future development.

The extension would be close to a site of historical interest and on a flood plain.

In addition the council feels that the B1172 would not be able to cope with the additional traffic that the extension would create.

Members questioned whether there is a demand for the extension. "Has a feasibility study for the need of an expansion been carried out post Covid? With changing habits e.g more people working from home and shopping online, is an extension to the existing facility still deemed necessary?

The final decision on the planning application will be made by South Norfolk Council.

Gritty Problem Around School

CONCERN was expressed at the December meeting of the parish council about the slippery state of the road leading to Woodside School during December's cold snap.

The road was not gritted by Norfolk Highways due to it not being adopted.

The council is to talk to developers Taylor Wimpey about gritting the road if another cold spell arrives in the New Year.

Once the road is adopted it will be Highways' responsibility to grit it.

Councillors agreed that once the road is adopted the situation will improve but felt a short term fix is also needed in order to avoid accidents caused by frost, snow and ice.

Pedestrian Crossing Request

THE council has received a request from a resident for a pedestrian crossing on the B1172 close to the junction of Colney Lane.

The resident said that they were "too nervous to cross the road with my children and I feel isolated as the Hethersett village facilities are entirely on the north side from Norwich Road. I tend to drive as a result. There is a bus stop near this junction on the south side of Norwich Road so the passengers using the bus service also need a safe crossing area.

"I would like to see a pedestrian crossing across Norwich Road near the bus stop to the east of Colney Lane and Station Lane. This will give safe pedestrian crossing, encourage walking and reduce the need for the use of cars for short distances,"

Plans to have traffic lights at the junctions of Colney Lane and Station Lane will be going ahead despite a temporary hold-up and councillors want to see what effect this has on the area before discussing the possibility of a pedestrian crossing further.

It was also felt that the traffic lights when in place will give pedestrians the chance to cross the road.

More Shorts

THE council is streamlining its committee system due to shortages on some of the committees and working groups. The development committee will

be dropped along with the Pavilion Committee which will no longer be needed.

Two bays at Hethersett Village Hall will be set-up in the near future for Beryl

Bikes which can be hired by residents. There will also be bike bays at the library.

There are plans to turn the current green area at Great Melton Close into a wildflower meadow. Local residents will be consulted, however, before any action is taken. The council is also looking into the possibility of creating another rewilding area on the B1172 adjacent to Church Farm.

It will be the New Year before any definite celebrations can be made for the May coronation of the New King. Hethersett has received no official protocol announcement from Buckingham Palace.



Debt Is The Number One Issue

Hethersett resident Mark Hitchcock is CEO of Norfolk Citizens' Advice. Here he talks about the high and increasing response to the charity's services.

NORFOLK Citizens' Advice is one of 250 charities based in local communities across the UK providing high quality, free and confidential advice on any issue.

The service has run in Norfolk since 1939 but has never seen as high a

demand for its services as this year. It is funded through donations and advice contracts, and largely delivered by a team of fantastic volunteers.

Citizens
Advice (CA)
monitors the
types of
issues that


clients are asking about and regularly reports on trends across Norfolk and in local communities.

CA helped over 2,100 people in South Norfolk in 2022.

We have seen a 20% increase in people needing help with benefits as a direct result of people in debt increasing so significantly. Debt as an issue has grown 17% this year and has

become the number one issue across Norfolk. Twelve months ago it would not have been in the top five issues and has been driven up as a result of energy costs and the wider cost-of-living crisis.


South Norfolk is clearly feeling the



impact of cost of living pressures with the need for charitable support and foodbank usage up significantly this year. In the last three months alone, there has been a 40% increase in clients needing this sort of help.

Energy continues to be the biggest issue and key driver for debt.

CA services supported just over 100 people with energy issues locally in 2021 – and surpassed that figure by



June this year. Of course, the figures only relate to those who come to CA and probably only relate to new contacts for energy advice.

This underlines the continuing trend of people failing into debt who have never had to consider their budget so carefully before. We're seeing more and more people who have never had to ask for this sort of support before.

Of the people coming to us for cost-ofliving issues, 64% are women, 60% have a disability or long-term health condition and 66% are aged 30-60 years of age.

Hethersett and the surrounding parishes demonstrate very similar issues to the rest of South Norfolk. There's been a four-fold increase in debt issues in the village in 2022 compared to 2021. The number of people looking for benefits help has doubled while the number of energy issues logged increased by 750%.

What is really noteworthy is that over

70% of clients in the village are women – a much higher average than across Norfolk.

There is a lot of information available for people struggling with the cost of living and particularly those working through issues with energy providers.

If you are facing debt in any way, you are advised to seek help from experts at Citizens Advice or another debt expert. Make sure they are FCA authorised to advise you.

A Great Britten

Herald columnist John Head looks back at the career of a Suffolk music legend.

BENJAMIN BRITTEN

(22 November 1913 – 4 December 1976)

ANOTHER memory of my time at Wymondham College (1964-69) was compulsory music lessons where we were herded into a Nissen Hut to listen to our music master, a genial man known to us as 'Gutty' Baker, extol the virtues of the classical composers.

He always asked us what we would like to hear but always declined our requests for Tchaikovsky's 1812 Overture or Sibelius' Karelia Suite – Intermezzo.

So, we were forced to listen to his choice which always included Ravel's Bolero, long before it was made famous by Torvill and Dean, and Benjamin Britten's Young Person's Guide to the Orchestra.



Years on, and when my interest in music matured, I became fascinated as to how the Suffolk landscape around Aldeburgh so inspired Benjamin Britten to write his music, especially his opera Peter Grimes.

Britten was born in Lowestoft, Suffolk, and educated at Gresham's School

before studying at the Royal College of Music in London. He moved to Aldeburgh in 1947 living at Crag House, Crag Path, overlooking the sea. Britten lived and worked in Suffolk for most of his life.

In 1948, together with the tenor Peter Pears and the theatrical director Eric Crozier, Britten formed the Aldeburgh Music Festival.

In 1967, to give this festival a permanent home, it moved to Snape Maltings which again was the creative idea of Benjamin Britten and Peter Pears.

Whilst I had visited Snape Maltings on several occasions it was not until this year that I stayed for a few days in Aldeburgh and it was easy to see how Britten was inspired by the vast skies and changeable seas of the Suffolk coast which so inspired his music.

Benjamin Britten's life was completely entwined with that of Peter Pears and he began to compose vocal music for Pears to sing including major roles in operas.

They lived together in The Red House Aldeburgh from 1957 until Britten's death in 1976, after which Pears remained in the house until he died in

1986.

The Benjamin Britten Tribute Memorial Scallop: The 'Scallop Memorial' sits on

the beach at Aldeburgh and was commissioned in 2003. It is a four-metre-high sculpture by local artist Maggi Hambling to the late Benjamin Britten who used to take his afternoon walks along the beach. The sculpture consists of two broken interlocking scallop shells. Cut into the rim of the upright shell are the words "I hear those voices that will not be drowned" from Britten's opera Peter Grimes.

It is a wonderful and fitting tribute to Benjamin Britten. And you can see images of it on the next two pages.

Britten also composed the War Requiem which was performed in 1962

for the consecration of the new Coventry Cathedral after the previous one was destroyed in a World War Two bombing raid.

The War Requiem was a public statement of Britten's anti-war convictions. It was a condemnation of the wickedness of war.

The music incorporates the settings of the First World War poet Wilfred Owen of whom I wrote about in the November edition of the Hethersett Herald.


