

#### Slight Change In Village's Political Map

THERE was a slight shift in the political balance in Hethersett following the district council elections on May 4th.

Nine candidates were up for election for three places with Local Conservative candidates David Bills and Kathryn Cross topping the poll but Labour and co-operative candidate John Morland capturing the third seat.

Mr Morland's election broke a stranglehold on the village that previously returned three Conservative candidates.

Turnout was 34.33% of the electorate.

# South Norfolk MP To Stand Down

MP for South Norfolk Richard Bacon has announced his intention not to stand for re-election at the next General Election.

Mr Bacon has come under considerable pressure from his own party and voters who have claimed that he has become the "Invisible Man" .

Posters claiming that he had gone missing were put up in the area a couple of years ago and Mr Bacon has repeatedly failed to answer letters, e-mails and phone calls made to him by constituents.

Hethersett Herald has advocated the need to be represented by a Member of Parliament who represents our needs and views and who is high profile in our area—something Mr Bacon has failed to do.

We have also been concerned at his official website which is always out of date and which some 100 days after Rishi Sunak became Prime Minister was still welcoming Liz Truss to that position. Currently the front page of the website still includes a tribute to Her Majesty The Queen on her Platinum Jubilee

In making his decision Mr Baker told the local Media that it was "time to give someone a chance."

Mr Bacon has been MP for South Norfolk since 2001 and had a majority of 21,275 at the last election in a seat that historically has been seen as a Conservative stronghold.

#### Hethersett Is Becoming More Rubbish Conscious

The May litter pick organised by the Hethersett Environmental Action Team under the auspices of Hethersett Parish Council attracted 18 volunteers who collected 10 bags of rubbish.

Afterwards one of the organisers Geoff Dyett praised what he feels is a cleaner Hethersett.

"Now you may think that is par for the course, however not so. The majority of the bags were only half full (if that) and it was mainly small items of litter. Well Done Hethersett I think the message is getting through and the majority of the litter is now being put in the bin or taken home.

"Also thank you to Hethersett Care Home who came to support us and supplied us with some goodies! One of our volunteers picked up six bottles of beer (unopened). Mind you four of them were of the no alcohol version, so was this why they were dumped?"

# Lease Of Queen's Head For Sale

THE lease of Hethersett Queen's Head Pub is up for sale but current landlord Richard Bond has assured customers and supporters that the venue will not close.

Over the past 25 years, Richard and Phillippa Bond have turned the Queen's into a top local venue with good food and drink and friendly service.

Now the couple are looking to retire as Richard explained to Hethersett Herald.: "The Queen's Head lease is for sale as after 44 years in hospitality I am looking to retire."

But he emphasised that he would continue to run the pub until a new leaseholder is found, however short or long a time this takes.

"We intend to continue to run the Queen's until a suitable purchaser is found, it will not close," he said.

#### Staff have been informed of

Richard's decision: "All the staff have been aware of our intentions for several months as they are key to the success of the business."

Richard also corrected people who believe the pub to be owned by Park Farm Hotel.

"The owners of Park Farm do have an interest in the Queen's Head but they do not own it. The leasehold is owned by Stonegate PLC."

The lease for the pub is up for sale at £99,500 and the annual turnover is stated to be £883,000 or  $\pounds$ 16,981 per week as the official advert above states.

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#### Fire At Former Woodside School Is Arson Say Police

SMOKE billowed from the grounds of the former Woodside School in Firs Road on May 23rd as Norfolk Fire Service attended a blaze that destroyed a shed and one of the former classrooms.

Police have subsequently confirmed that the firs is being treated as arson.

One local resident reported seeing a number of young people in the area at the time.

Appliances from Hethersett and Earlham attended and the fire was out within about 20 minutes.

The photograph opposite was sent to us by Andre Smith. Below that regular reader Tina Bowden posted a picture of the smoke billowing high into the sky.

The official fire brigade website had the following information following a call out at 7.04 pm.

"Appliances from Hethersett and Earlham attended an outbuilding fire on Firs Road. The crews used hose reel jets to extinguish. The stop message was received at 19:29."





### New Crossing Planned

A new pedestrian crossing in Back Lane will make the area safer for local children.

The idea of a crossing to help with safety issues is something that has been supported by the parish council, our district councillors and County Councillor David Bills for some time.

Now after full consultation the go-ahead has been given and work will start shortly.

County Councillor Bills said he was delighted that the crossing will go ahead, making the area safer for everyone and in particular for children, parents and guardians at school times in the mornings and afternoons.

HETHERSETT celebrated the King's Coronation in style with a massive picnic in the park event and a four day flower festival in the parish church.


The village event took place on the field next to the village hall and also saw the official opening of the Community Back Garden.



Even with news items that we accept as 'real' – do they engender this feeling of schadenfreude?

No, no, no, we don't really enjoy the

sufferings of others - still, though it's pretty natural to feel relief that it isn't us in the various dire situations that feature so heavily on every news bulletin.

Anyway, we can always assuage these feelings by making some sort of donation to some sort of charity – and that has to be something positive to come from our various mixed feelings.

To return to the Coronation – whether we are ardent royalists or fiery republicans, I expect we all felt some sympathy for the major (and minor) players on this particular stage.


Having to get it all 'right' - with so many public and private eyes on us must engender such a mixture of feelings, including anxiety and pride, of course.

Then there's all the feelings about the 'awkward' people there - those no longer entirely (or even slightly) within the family fold but who need to be invited (and their need to be present).


Perhaps most of us have (or have had) the odd bits of family discord, including people we no longer see, but wish that we did - or those that we do see, but wish that we didn't!

Maybe Tolstoy had it right: 'All happy families are alike; each unhappy family is unhappy in its own way'.

Expect we're fortunate if we're somewhere in the middle of those extremes - with just occasional moments of nostalgia prompted by the seismic public occasions in the lives of those more famous (but no more worthy) than ourselves.







# Lynne's Very Own Coronation

WHILE my husband was watching the coronation he reminded me of my first Queen-making/enskinment ceremony.

It lasted five days. Involved tough travel, very rough accommodation, heat stroke, multiple thousands of people, beautiful hand-woven robes, numerous dancers and

drummers and a reporter from The Times who told us he had never ever had such a tough time even with all the dangerous assignments he had carried out.

He also collected a bladder parasite (not my fault). My golden coach equivalent was a young man who carried me triumphantly through the crowds.

My throne was made from huge goatskin cushions (hence the term 'enskinment'). Further South chiefs, kings etc are 'enstooled' sitting on wooden or even golden stools.

My coronation feast was the raw innards of a just-slaughtered goat, brought in ceremony to me on a tray to select which organ I wanted them to prepare for me.

I slept in a room without electricity of

Very few people get to have their own Coronation but Lynne Symonds from Great Melton is one of them. Lynne started the Wulugu Charity which works to tackle poverty through education in Northern Ghana. As a measure of the esteem that Lynne is held in, she was made an official Queen of one of the tribes. Here she recounts what happened to her on a very different coronation to that we have experienced in the United Kingdom.



course, with 30 senior tribesmen and religious leaders sleeping on the ground outside of my room. The 'toilet' involved a walk in the dark and avoiding the snakes.

#### There was an

eclipse that night--breath-taking - that the people said was an omen predicting the success of my new role.

I was, and am, the only white woman chief of the Mamprusi people. They have told me they will never bestow this honour on anyone else. Other white people have been made eg village chiefs in return for helping, but there has never been a white woman chief of the whole tribe. Mamprusi are the second largest tribe in Ghana with an amazing history. They live proudly in North Ghana in the Mamprugu Kingdom. The people are amongst the poorest and most deprived in Ghana -indeed in much of Africa. There is a huge divide

between the North and South.

My tribespeople work hard to overcome the relentless poverty and are well

aware that education, particularly for girls and women, is the most effective route forward.

The people are clever and strong, but often live without proper medical care and face unsurmountable challenges to their attempts to make better lives for their children, just needing a leg-up

to overcome the neglect.

Over the years we have built a precious relationship of mutual trust and respect. The charity we set up 'The Wulugu Project' is regarded by many as the most effective education-based charity in North Ghana. It is known for overcoming the norm of corruption and has built or substantially re



-built almost 100 schools.

All the work in Ghana and UK is carried out by unpaid volunteers. Its work in bringing uneducated girls and women back into vocational training has been used as a model of good practice in tackling slavery.

It has an award from the world churches for helping keep peace.

I travelled back through Heathrow with piles of bloody animal skins and my throne. They let me through!

# Pink Line Teething Problems Solved

#### THE launch of the new bus service to the village didn't go exactly to plan on May 14th but is now fully active as we report here.


IT is designed to improve the frequency of buses to the village as well as to serving the new North

Hethersett development, but on launch day— Sunday May 14th - the new Pink Line number 11 service encountered an immediate problem.

The double decker found it impossible to negotiate the area around Recreation Road/West Croft due to weekend vehicles parked around the Memorial Playing Field.

The trustees of the Memorial Playing Field pre -empted the problems by contacting groups using the park to ask them not to park on the immediate roads.

Before the launch date the trustees sent out the following:

"Information has been received that First Bus are adding a new bus service (extending the service 11) to run from the hospital to Hethersett. The service will come into Hethersett via the new housing estate in North Hethersett and then down Mill Road, turn into Park Drive then West Croft returning to Norwich via Mill Road and the same route.

"The service starts on Sunday 14th May and will run seven days a week and be half-hourly. It is understood it will be double deckers.

"Clearly on the Playing Field's busy days, overspill parking tends be on both

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sides of West Croft and on Park Drive near the junction. If that continues we can see a load of problems for the buses and no doubt bring police presence.

"Please inform all your members to park sensibly and legally if they have to park outside the playing field, especially until the car park is extended."

An anonymous posting on the All Things Hethersett Facebook site underlined the problems on the service's first day:

"The bus was unable to serve a stop at West Croft/ Park Drive due to poorly parked cars being double parked from right on the junction well into West Croft making it a right squeeze even for small cars."

First Buses seemed to think that the problems were partly caused by local residents who parked vehicles on the road to deliberately prevent buses from passing.

Steve Wickers, Bus Service Improvement Plan Delivery Manager, in a letter to residents of Woodcote Sheltered Housing complex who had campaigned for a bus to stop closer to their homes, stated:

"You may be aware that there was an incident yesterday (May 14th) which the Police attended in respect of the section of the route around Park Drive/ West Croft re the new Pink Line bus service.

"This was subject to a diversion after residents refused to move parked cars (allegedly placed as a protest to stop the bus route).

"Although things have improved this

morning (May 15th), drivers from First Buses are still having some difficulties getting through.

"I do hope things settle down but wondered if you could use your contacts to further demonstrate the importance of this new service to local residents."

Comments on social media seemed divided on the subject of the new route.

On Facebook some blamed users of the park and others local residents. Other posts pointed out that vehicles were legally parked at the side of the road.

It remains to be seen how this story pans out. Additional car parking spaces at the new pavilion should help with any problems but weekends can be difficult in that area.

Meanwhile residents of Woodcote have expressed their delight with the new service which brings buses much closer for them and North Hethersett development now has a twice hourly service to the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital and into Norwich.

And by the middle of the first week of operations, things had improved considerably as Mr Wickers pointed out in a letter to Woodcote:

"I have been advised by First Buses there is already good usage and I am sure this will increase as the services establish.

"I hope your residents are enjoying the new service and many thanks for your continued support," the message said.

We were keen to try out the new service and you can read about how we found it on the next page.

## An Enjoyable Journey

JUMPING onto the new Pink Line service to the village was an enjoyable experience as I took the bus from West Croft all the way to Sprowston, purely in the interests of research you understand. In the interests of research and keeping everyone abreast of village matters, Peter Steward travelled from Hethersett to Sprowston on the new Pink Number 11 bus service to the village. Here's how he found the journey.

Aided and abetted by my free senior bus pass, I caught the 9.50 am bus on a Monday morning. Prior to getting on, I had a delightful conversation with a lady whose bungalow is virtually next to the new bus stop.

"You don't mind having the stop outside your home or people waiting for a bus"? I inquired.

"Not al all. It's lovely to have the new service. It's so convenient for me," she replied adding that as a fan of the Metro Newspaper crossword she often pops out when she sees a bus coming to pick up her copy of the free paper. Ironically on this particular day there were no Metros on board.

I stayed on the bus through to Sprowston and it was a pleasant journey. I must point out that on this particular Monday morning the traffic was very light and there were no holdups apart from a set of temporary traffic lights on Colney Lane close to Norwich City's training ground.

So for those not quite sure of the route the new service takes, here is a rundown with timings thrown in for good measure.

The bus left West Croft at 9.50 and turned right onto Mill Road and then right again into the village (9.55 am) and then left into Henstead Road and right into Back Lane and then left onto Coachmakers Way (9.58). It went right at the end of Coachmakers and then left onto Colney Lane and past Norwich City's training ground (10.03).

It turned right into Rosalind Franklin Road and arrived at the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital at 10.06. The journey from Hethersett to the hospital took just 11 minutes, although I must point out once again that the traffic was very light.

The bus set off from the hospital at 10.10 and drove alongside the grounds of the University of East Anglia, arriving at the Cringleford Bus Interchange at 10.15 am.

It then went the customary route along Newmarket Road and into the city arriving at St Stephens at 10.25, Castle Meadow at 10.32 where it changed drivers and then Tombland at 10.41, Anglia Square at 10.42 and Wroxham Road at 10.46. It stopped outside the Brickmakers Pub at 10.51 and I alighted just the other side of the roundabout on the inner ring road and walked back into the city.

I caught the Pink Line bus back at 1.15 pm. It was at the hospital at 1.40 and the centre of Hethersett at 1.49, taking just 34 minutes from the centre of Norwich to the centre of Hethersett. Obviously at busy times this journey will be longer. The route has a lot going for it: It's great if you need to get to the hospital and don't want to pay their crazy car parking charges. It's a double decker bus so there is plenty of room without cramming in as we often have to do on the service 15.

The route serves part of the new North Hethersett development which is another good enhancement of the service and it's a good way of getting into the UEA grounds for a walk round the University Broad and, dare I say it, a cup of coffee at their café/restaurant.

The only drawback is that it's a slower route into Norwich than that of the 15 which also goes through the village and the number 6 and 13 which go along the B1172.

Overall it's a good addition to the bus service to the village and a comfortable way of getting to the hospital, into Norwich and beyond and it runs twice an hour.


#### Facebook Page Hits 5,000

Mr Keeley died in the Norfolk and Norwich University Hospital on April 10th.


He leaves his wife Shirley, two daughters—Heather and Diane—four grandchildren and six great grandchildren.

Mrs Lawrence originally took over as chair of the council on the resignation of Adrienne Quinlan for health reasons.

## More Parking Concerns in Village

THE parish council has received three letters from residents about parking problems in the village.

The first referred to the area around the junction of Great Melton Road and Cromwell Close, the second parking close to the Mosque on Henstead Road and the third abuse of the short stay car park in Great Melton Road. A resident expressed concern at parking around the Mosque in Henstead Road which they claimed has become dangerous..

"Driving down the road is impossible when the overspill of cars are everywhere. Let alone the parking on paths which is making it impossible to get a pushchair through. The parking cannot continue as it is not considerate to others living within the area and is dangerous."

Parish clerk Annette Palmer has passed the comments onto the Mosque authorities.

A separate contact from the public complained about parking around the junction of Great Melton Road and Cromwell Close.

"The parking in this area is becoming more and more problematic and dangerous. It is a bus route and can cause delays. It is a hazard to vulnerable users accessing both the shops and health services. Cars are more frequently obstructing the footpath increasing the difficulty for wheelchairs, parents with prams, mobility scooters and dog walkers."

The parish clerk pointed out the difficulties in taking action in such matters:

"The Parish Council has discussed inconsiderate parking in the village on many occasions. Unfortunately, it is very difficult to police/manage. If a vehicle parks on single or double yellow lines this can be reported to South Norfolk Council by email at parking@southnorfolkandbroadland.go v.uk. The matter will then be dealt with by the Civil Enforcement Officer.

"If a vehicle has parked across a dropped kerb which prevents access from a driveway, then this may be considered an offence of wilful obstruction under S137 of the Highways Act 1980 and should be reported to the police using the 101 service.

"Whilst it is not an offence to partly park on the pavement, it is an offence under S72 of the Highways Act 1935 to drive onto a pavement. It is also an offence under S137 of the Highways Act 1980 for vehicles to wilfully obstruct a pavement. Again, this should be reported to the police using the 101 service.

"Going forward on steps that can be taken to prevent inconsiderate parking, the installation of yellow lines may be one option. However, this is a very

lengthy and expensive procedure. Public consultation needs to be undertaken which may result in legal challenges. Additionally, it may be deemed that the 'problem' is simply being moved onto other areas in the village. "

The matters weren't discussed at the May meeting of the parish council due to time constraints. The third "problem area" was discussed, however.

A resident of Great Melton Close spoke about the abuse of the short term car park with vehicles being left all day. Others were left on the path, causing an obstruction. Motorists also parked on the path whilst they waited for a space to become available. The resident claimed that the road surface has been damaged by vehicles thinking that they could get through the road, finding their way blocked and turning around. This was also making the area dangerous for local residents.

"We shouldn't have to put up with vehicles causing damage and we are concerned that somebody will get hurt. Something has got to be done before somebody gets injured. We have had people tearing into the close and then finding they can't get through. Because of this, the tarmac is beginning to break up," the resident said.

The public were urged to report cases of obstruction to the police. District Councillor Kathryn Cross agreed to take the matter up with the village's county councillor David Bills.

It was on a November evening in 1987 with torch in hand and in the pouring rain we decided to purchase an infill plot on Firs Road Hethersett.


On 21st March 1988 we completed our move there from King's Lynn.



#### HETHERSETT GARDENING CLUB—with secretary Leslie Dale

At our May meeting Tom Everett, Head Groundsman at the University of East Anglia spoke about the "Conservation of the UEA's Landscape".

Originally sited on a golf course within the Earlham Hall estate, we learned of its five County Wildlife Sites :- The Yare Valley, the University Marsh, the 18 acre Broad, the Heronry and Violet Grove.

It has 2500 trees, 360 acres of accessible land and a sculpture trail.

It enjoys an eight point Landscape Strategy Plan which is very biased toward promoting biodiversity, one which local community groups, including the "Norwich Fringe Group" participate in.

The Earlham Hall herbaceous border will be of particular interest to gardeners; whilst its "Dutch Garden" has been developed into a "Silent Space".

The University Lands are open all year round to everyone and its reassuring to know that all its trees are subjected to a two and a half yearly exam process, involving both winter and summer visits.

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## Changes To Library Service in Little Melton

Changes are being made to the mobile library service in Little Melton as Rebecca Heaser explains.

The changes follow the public consultation last year and the final decisions made by Norfolk County Council Cabinet in January 2023. One mobile library will be decommissioned. The county council will continue to operate five vehicles, and an electric mini mobile, due for commission later this year. In accordance with the key principles agreed by members, Norfolk Library and Information Service will cease the majority of stops that happen within 1.5 miles of a branch library.

They will be working with customers to ensure they know what is happening. Anyone unable to visit a branch library will be able to contact their local library and request a visit from the Home Library Service (HLS) that they operate in partnership with the Royal Voluntary Services (RVS).

Every route and stop has now been reviewed and, whilst they have tried to minimise disruption, it does mean that in a number of cases the day and time which the mobile library visits has had to change. This is to ensure best use of the mobile library resource for as many people and communities as possible.

From Monday 3rd July the only stop in Little Melton will be on Thursdays at 5 pm at School Lane outside no 93/95 with a postcode of NR9 3LA.



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# Lords of the Manor

THE manor that would eventually become known as Hethersett Cromwells was originally one of two manors in Hethersett.

It was the larger of the two, and is best thought of as an estate. At the time it was not what is known as nucleated - it does not seem to have been a village with all of the residents grouped in the one location. Instead, there were dispersed farms and dwellings grouped around small common greens or fields.

It was likely in existence for a century, perhaps more, before Harold fell at Hastings in 1066. This is however the earliest mention of Hethersett itself, but from then on, we can trace the line of the Lords of the Manor through to the 20th century. Many of these Lords were quite remote from the village. It was one of very many holdings and we know nothing of who lived in Hethersett at the time. However some were resident, or lived nearby.

Whether their lord was local or not, if they were drawn into conflict or controversy, the villagers would be also. It could be through excess rent, a call to arms or by raids of their Lord's enemies.

In some respects tracing the lordship of Hethersett is an academic pursuit.

It doesn't directly describe life in the village itself.

But if we pull at the strings attached to these "Great Men" (and Women), we can discover crumbs of information about the village and discern new places to search for more. Historian Lewis Buckingham continues his history of the village with a list of Lords of the Manor in bygone times.

#### The last Anglo-Saxon Lord c1045 - c1069

#### Ulf, son of Manni Swart

A Thane of Edward the Confessor. Also referred to as a man of Esgar the Staller.

His background was Danish, his grandfather having come with King Canute in 1016. Ulf held much land in Norfolk and Suffolk, as well as elsewhere. He is mentioned in Norfolk as far back as around 1045 and likely held Hethersett from at least that time. He withdrew from a land dispute with the Abbey of Bury St Edmunds after being bitten by a snake, in fear it was a sign of God's displeasure with the case.

#### From the Time of the Conqueror

#### c1069-c1075

#### Earl Ralf Guader

Earl of East Anglia

Of mixed Breton and English parentage. He fought at the Battle of Hastings. Hethersett was given to him (amongst many other properties) by William the Conqueror some time after the conquest of 1066.

This was perhaps around 1069 when he, alongside Esgar the Staller (the lord of Ulf, the previous Lord of Hethersett),

defeated a force of Danes at Norwich. Ralf was made Earl after this battle.

Ralph forfeited his lands after he led the Revolt of the Earls in 1075. He fled with his army from Cambridge presumably through Hethersett - to Norwich. His wife was left behind to defend Norwich Castle while he went to the continent.

#### The Lords of Middleham

#### c1075-c1110

#### Ribald de Middleham

Lord of Middleham

Illegitimate half-brother of Alan, Earl of Richmond, Ribald probably fought alongside his brother at Hastings. They were Bretons and their contingent was at the vanguard of William's army, arriving half an hour earlier at Hastings than the rest. Earl Alan gave Ribald the Lordship of Middleham, which had been laid waste by the harrying of the North. By a strange quirk this land in Yorkshire

included Hethersett and other land in Norfolk. Earl Alan had become tenant in chief after the forfeiture of Earl Ralph. Ribald retired to a monastery after the death of his Wife Beatrice around 1110.

#### c1110-1168

#### Ralph de Middleham

Lord of Middleham

Took up the Lordship of Middleham after his father retired to a monastery. Ralph married Agatha, daughter of Robert de Brus, the 4x Great Grandfather of the later King of Scotland.

#### 1168-1185

#### **Robert fitz Ralph**

Lord of Middleham.

Inherited upon the death of his father Ralf. He built the castle at Middleham.

His wife Helewise was the daughter of Ranulph de Glanville, the Chief Justice of England.


#### 1185-1194

#### Waleran fitz Robert

Lord of Middleham.

Aged 15 at the death of his father, Waleran and his brothers were wards of their grandfather Ranulph de Glanville, Chief Justice of England. The future King John was educated by de Glanville and may have been raised by him for a time alongside Waleran and his brothers.

Waleran and his mother founded a monastery in Swainby, Yorkshire, while he was still underage. Among other things, they gifted the monastery



tithes and pasture for 1000 sheep and 40 beasts in Hethersett and Pikenham. Waleran's mother Helewise died around the same time as he did, and was buried in the monastery. Waleran died without children.

#### 1194-c1206

#### **Ralph fitz Robert**

Lord of Middleham.

Brother of Waleran, he inherited upon his death, but died around 1206 without children.

#### c1206-1252

#### Ranulph fitz Robert

Lord of Middleham.

Third son of Robert fitz Ralph, he inherited upon his brother Ralph's death. He married Mary Bigod, the daughter of Roger, Earl of Norfolk. The Bigods around this time held land in Hethersett, including Thickthorn.

Ranulph moved the abbey at Swainsby to Coverham, near his home, so that his mother's bones could

be close by. He followed King John to war in Ireland and fought against him in the First Barons. War. Ranulph made peace with John before the king's death. Upon his accession the following year John's son Henry III forced Ranulph to give his daughters as hostages as a surety for his conduct.


#### 1252--1270

#### Ralph fitz Ranulph

Lord of Middleham.

Inherited on the death of his father Ranulph.

Fought with King Henry III twice in



Gascony. Ralph supported the King during the Second Barons. War against Simon de Montfort. During the conflict Hethersett was raided and land and goods were seized by supporters of the Barons. Ralph died without a male heir.

#### 1270-1272

## Daughters of Ralph - Joan, Mary and Anastasia each inherit a third.

Their husbands held the portions of the manor "by right of" their wives -Robert de Tateshale for Joan, Robert de Neville for Mary, and initially the King for Anastasia, who was unmarried. King Henry owed his son the future Edward I a large debt and gave him the right to give away Anastasia's hand in recompense. She was then married (for a large price) to Gilbert Haunsard, but died soon after.



#### <u>The Manor of</u> <u>Hethersett</u> <u>Tateshale (1272-</u> <u>1306)</u>

1272 -1298

## Robert de Tateshale (by right of Joan his Wife)

1<sup>st</sup> Lord of Tatteshale

Joan and Robert bought out her sister Mary's share of Hethersett.

Robert fought with Edward I many times in Wales and Scotland. He was made the first Lord Tateshale for his valour, and died in 1298. At the time he had 80 tenants in Hethersett.

#### 1298-1303

#### Robert de Tateshale

2<sup>nd</sup> Lord of Tateshale

Inherited as son of Joan and Robert. Robert joined his father on expeditions in Gascony and Wales, as well as fighting in Scotland after his father's death. Close with the Driby and Bernak families.

#### 1303-1306

#### Robert de Tateshale

A minor, he inherited from his father Robert and died young without heirs.

#### 1306

#### Joan de Driby (nee Tateshale)

Joan and her two sisters inherited, as heirs of their brother Robert, the first Lord Tateshale, who died in 1298.

## William de Bernak and wife Alice (de Driby)

Purchased Manor from Alice's Aunt Joan de Tateshale as joint tenants.


First Lords of the Manor to live in Hethersett. William died in 1339 and was buried in St Remigius in Hethersett.

#### 1339-1341

#### Alice de Bernak

Lady of the Manor in her own right after the death of William.

A wealthy heiress, she inherited the lands of the Driby and Tateshale families and was buried in St Remigius



in Hethersett 1341-1346 John de Bernak		Son of William and Alice de Bernak, he inherited upon Joan's death. Described as perpetually sick a few years before the end of his life.	

#### 1348-1361

#### Joan de Bernak (nee Marmion)

Widow of John, she held 1/3 of the Manor as her Dower after his death. She outlived both of her sons.

#### 1346-1348

#### John de Bernak

Son of John - a minor - inherited 2/3rds on the death of his father John.

Robert de Ufford, Earl of Suffolk had Wardship of John and his brother William. He was close to Edward III, advising him as to the location chosen for the Battle of Crecy.

He loaned the king a great deal of money in order to finance his wars. It was on the eve of departure for the campaign that included Crecy that the King granted him the wardship of the Bernak children, and the proceeds of the Manor of Hethersett.

Ufford's wife Margaret was the niece of Simon de Hedersete, the Lord of the other Manor in Hethersett. Her first husband had been Thomas de Cailly, Alice de Bernak's cousin.

John died while still in wardship, possibly of the Black Death.

#### 1348-1360

#### William de Bernak

Brother and heir of John - a minor also. He inherited his brother's 2/3rds of the Manor. He also died while a ward of Robert de Ufford, Earl of Suffolk, and predeceased his mother.

Upon the failure of the male line, John and William's elder sister Maud de Bernak inherited Hethersett and much more besides. She was married to Ralph de Cromwell, from which the Manor of Hethersett Cromwells took the name it would hold for evermore.

Her descendants would hold it until the time of the Flowerdewe family 200 years later.

## The Birth Of A Nation

Historian and Hethersett Herald columnist John Head turns the clock back to the First World War in his latest column and talks about the battle of Vimy Ridge.


#### 9<sup>th</sup>-12<sup>th</sup> April 1917

The Battle of Vimy Ridge was part of the Battle of Arras where the four divisions of the Canadian Corps in the 1<sup>st</sup> Army fought against three divisions of the German 6<sup>th</sup> Army.

When Britain declared war on Germany in 1914 Canada, as a Dominion, was also at war, albeit Canada had the right to decide what form its contribution to the war effort would be.

Vimy Ridge was a pivotal moment in Canadian history in that all four Canadian Infantry Divisions serving in France attacked together.

On Easter Monday 9<sup>th</sup> April 1917 in driving sleet the four divisions of the Canadian Corps commanded by Lt Gen J. H. G.




Byng, attacked Vimy Ridge, one of the strongest German defensive positions in Northern France which had resisted all previous attacks.

The attack was well rehearsed and was assisted by miles of tunnels and trenches to approach the enemy lines under a rolling artillery barrage. By midday only the highest point of the ridge remained in enemy hands. This fell the following day. On the next page you can see six examples of the tunnels and trenches in 2017 at Vimy Ridge

With incredible bravery and discipline the Canadians took Vimy Ridge in only four days.



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## **Keep Your Peepers Peeled**

KEEP your peepers peeled because there are coincidences around every corner.

When it comes to unearthing history and coincidences I am something of a champion.

Wherever I go I search for coincidences and they abound in Norfolk.

A rather cool but sunny day in May found us in St Mary's Church in Great Massingham. On the wall was quite an elaborate painting and underneath it an inscription which read:

"Presented to the church in memory of Mabel A McAnally by her husband the Rector July 1st 1931."

The name McAnally stood out. A number of years ago I put together a website for my home village of Hethersett entitled Hethersett A Village At War. It was a look at the village from 1910 to 1950 with particular emphasis on the two world Wars.

The Rector of Hethersett during the First World War was a fascinating man by the name of Frederick Jarvis. He served for a year as a chaplain on the Western Front and regularly wrote reports and letters for the village Good News magazine which I currently have the honour of editing.

He was succeeded as Rector by the

Rev Thomas McAnally and you can probably see where this is going.

Rev McAnally wrote about life in the village and the international situation as the Second World War unfolded. Before war broke out he told us there wouldn't be a conflict as Mr Hitler was an honourable man.

So we had a rector of Great Massingham called Charles McNally

## War Writing

The Rev James Mortimer La Fontaine McAnally spent over seven years serving the village before the outbreak of the Second World War.

He wrote extensively about war and the part it played in Hethersett. The Rev McAnally was married with a daughter Rachel Mary. Rachel married Donald Dashwood on 21st December 1940 and died on 8th May, 2001. Rev McAnally had a very varied career.

He was born in 1888 which made him 44 when he moved to Hethersett and 51 at the outbreak of the second world war. He was educated at Keeble College, Oxford, gaining a BA degree in 1909 and a Masters Degree in 1913. He was made a deacon in 1911 and a priest in1912 and was curate at

Wymondham from 1911 to 1913 before working at Edgbaston in Birmingham from 1913 to 1916 and Eton College from 1917 until 1921.

He was Rector of Newdigate in Surrey from 1921 until 1927

and a rector of Hethersett called James McNally. Not being a particularly common name, I felt there must be a connection and this was confirmed when I

found out that Mrs McNally's maiden name was La Fontaine and that the Hethersett Rectors full name was and Rector of Haslemere in Surrey from 1927 until 1932 when he moved to Hethersett where he stayed until 1942. He was also vicar of nearby Ketteringham from 1939 until 1942. He moved to Alton Barnes in Wiltshire where he stayed until 1945 when he became vicar of Netherbury with Solway Ash in Dorset. He served there until 1953 and was curate in charge of nearby Stoke Abbott from 1949 to 1951 and Rector from 1951 to 1953.

He was Rural Dean of Beaminster in Dorset from 1948 to 1953 before moving to St Edmundsbury and Ipswich from 1953 to 1956 and that saw him living in Southwold. He was Rector of Spexhall with Wissett in Suffolk from 1956 to 1958 before being awarded the living of Shotesham in 1959. He was curate in charge at Worstead and at Westwick with Sloley from 1962 to 1964. It is likely that he died in either 1976 or 1977.



James Mortimer La Fontaine McAnally. It didn't take long and a small amount of research to find out that Hethersetts James was indeed the son of the Rev Charles and Mrs Mabel McAnally. Incidentally Mrs McAnally was born in Constantinople in Turkey (now Istanbul).

Just finding the link gave me a kick. And the moral of this story is quite simple - coincidences are everywhere, just keep your eyes and ears open to find them.

There follows a couple of pieces of writing by Rev McNally—the first is from May 1938 as the world moves towards war. It shows the rector's concerns at the amount of money being spent in defence.

As I anticipated in my letter last month, a comprehensive agreement with Italy has been signed, which materially lessens the feeling of tension. And now that France has decided to follow suit and to settle the outstanding Franco-Italian points of disagreement, a real beginning has been made with what has been described as general appeasement in Europe.

It remains to be seen whether a similar agreement can be reached with Germany and perhaps in particular between Germany and Russia. If that were possible, a great load of anxiety would be lifted from the minds of the peoples of the world. But at present Germany, through her leader, has preferred to keep us guessing what she will do next and to strike suddenly at her prey rather than to formulate precise demands which might be discussed calmly and deliberately round a conference table.

Until she is willing to do this, we cannot but remain profoundly anxious and we must continue to pile up armaments costing millions of money which could so much better be spent on all matter of social improvements. A considerable reduction in taxation could raise the whole standard of living and at the same time provide a large surplus for much needed reforms. To take one or two instances at random, just think what it would mean to have a proper water and drainage system in every village, a bath and electric light in every home and more adequate pensions for old people. All these things and much else could be provided, if we were not compelled to spend about 350 millions a year on armaments.

The following article by the rector appeared in Good News of June 1939 as war became closer:

"I continue to be entirely optimistic about the world situation, especially now that the prospect of an alliance with Russia is much brighter. Great Britain, France, Russia, Poland, Rumania, Turkey and Greece present a truly formidable military combination, and if the USA, also gave active assistance it would seem there is an overwhelming balance of power on the side of democracy and peace.

"Incidentally we might add there is the nucleus of a great new League of Nations into which Germany and Italy would be welcome just as soon as they gave any positive proofs of a change of outlook.

"But we must not relax our our efforts towards rearmament, for at present it is only too clear that the two dictators understand nothing except superior force. And any

weakening would encourage them to make further raids on other people's possessions.

"The introduction of conscription in peace time is a revolution in British policy, but it is necessitated by the gravity of the world situation. We don't know how many young men from Hethersett will be called up but we hope they will realise that there is a dignity and honour in service.

"And British people as a whole need to be reminded that a period of military service is compulsory in all other democratic countries. "

By October 1940 the war has begun and the Rector seems to feel it will soon be over as he writes:

"As I sit in the garden writing, I can hear an Air Raid alarm, which may add point to what I am about to say. Although it requires considerable effort to take one's mind off the immediate events of the war and to look forward, I am sure that the effort is worth making. In fact it is one of the best ways by which to preserve ones'

mental balance. All who are not actually engaged in the war should bring their minds to bear upon the problems that will arise after the cessation of hostilities and try to get clear the ideals for which we strive and explore the means by which they can be achieved.

"The international problems are plain enough: the policy to be adopted towards Germany: the restoration of the invaded countries: fixing of new frontiers: the limitation of armaments: the disposition of the colonial empires and mandated territories: the question of security.

"Many of our own social problems are also clear: the return of soldiers to civil life: housing and standards of wages: the precarious position of the middle classes under increased taxation: the reform of the civil service: state of voluntary hospitals: agriculture, self supporting or state aided.

"All of us should be concerned with these questions."
