We Deserve Better

WE as a village deserve so much better when it comes to facilities.

February saw the closure of the village pharmacy for three consecutive days from the 14th to 16th, bringing a considerable amount of inconvenience for those who turned up to pick up prescriptions unaware of the closures.

They were faced with a piece of paper stuck on the inside of the door apologising that the shop was shut.

"We're sorry but our store is temporarily closed today." No reasons were given and it appears little or no advance warning was given.

The closure came during the half-term holiday when the shop would normally be very busy with people picking up new and repeat prescriptions.

It is far from the first time that the pharmacy has been closed at short notice.

As our village continues to expand you might think that facilities would also improve and increase but sadly this

appears to be far from the case.

As new development brings more people to our village we seem to be getting less and less, particularly in the area of health.

Ironically the notice of daily closure was placed next to a poster showing the pharmacy's opening hours.

Hethersett Herald placed a notice on the All Things Hethersett Facebook site asking for comments and experiences of Boots Chemists and residents were quick to respond as you can read by turning to page three

Residents Complain About Pharmacy Service

WE asked for comments via social media about the lack of service from Boots Pharmacy over a three day period in February.

The shop was shut for that period of time over half-term, meaning that people were frustrated in their attempts to obtain much need medicines.

Below are just a few of the comments we received. (please note that we have deliberately not included the names of those who have made comments but happens so their identity can be verified by looking at the editor's post on the All Things Hethersett Facebook page of February 14th).

Some of the comments are specific to the situation in Hethersett and the lack of warning about the closures whilst others comment on the rather broader picture.

"I walked to Boots this morning, not knowing it was closed. The notice on the door only said closed today. I had intended to return tomorrow as my prescription is ready for collection, but realise from your post that they are closed all week! Did I miss a message from Boots on All Things Hethersett informing people about this? "

"The guy that was there at the same time as me is diabetic and has run out of meds."

"I went round yesterday to collect my prescription which I requested on February 3rd. Had a text message to say it was ready but I couldn't pick it up as the pharmacy was closed. Went

round again today, still closed and have just learned that it is also closed tomorrow. I have no other way of getting my medication and I expect that when it does reopen there will be an enormous queue. I am retired and have time to keep going back but if you are working and dealing with a family it must be very difficult to keep yourself healthy ."

> "I have had many problems with this shop and this is causing me so much stress. What can one do to get medication?"

"I'm furious. I put my request in with the doctor for my repeat prescription three

weeks ago. I went in just before five on Saturday (forgetting they closed at 5 on Saturdays.) Needless to say my order was not ready, the surgery turn them around in three or four days, I was asked if I could come back on Monday and I said I would, I got a text on Monday to say it was ready, now you say it's closed? "

"Went in my wheelchair to pick up a prescription for my husband yesterday. All the way there: closed. Happens so often that I now get my prescriptions delivered. Last time we were quoted ten days wait. I will say all staff have been brilliant for emergency needs though. No issues with the staff - I just wish there were twice as many of them."

Many of the responses talked about receiving medicines through online applications:

"We gave up with the local pharmacy

and swapped to online. I realise this isn't an option to some non tech savvy people but we have not regretted changing."

"There are now plenty of pharmacies online and it seems doctors are to be found more and more online. I think this is a sign of the times. Like it or lump it it is here to stay."

"Sadly this is not isolated to Hethersett Pharmacy, although I have to say when I have needed urgent prescriptions the staff have been super helpful in ensuring I have what I need. They work under impossible circumstances and do their best."

"It's to do with a change Boots have made to how they pay (how much they pay) pharmacist locums so now no one wants to locum for Boots Pharmacies. I have issues with many of Boots Pharmacies in South Norfolk being shut with my job and was told this is why. "

There were a number of posts, however, that stood up for the service provided by Hethersett Pharmacy.

Comments included the following:

"I've always found that they are very accommodating. I usually call a week or two before meds are needed for my controlled medication and they always have it before the current items run out. Even under immense pressure they do try to meet everyone's needs and still smile. Sadly they suffer abuse on a regular basis and although they have supply issues sometimes, at least we have a pharmacy that on the whole cares about it's patients which is not always the case."

Ms Dawson quickly took to social media to state that the future of the café looks uncertain.

"As many of you would probably have heard/seen, sadly the property we currently lease is going up for sale. Only the property is for sale! The advert at Stratfords is very misleading.

"So our future here will all depend on if a new lease is possible with the new owners when we find out who that might be."

And Jane vowed to "continue trading here for the foreseeable future until we are told otherwise!"

Spreading The Joy of Reading

CHILDREN'S literacy charity Schoolreaders is urgently looking for enthusiastic volunteers who can help spread the joy of reading to children in local primary schools – especially around Hethersett and Norwich.

The much-needed charity recruits volunteers to listen to children read weekly in primary schools, focusing on schools with the greatest need.

Every year one in four children leave primary school unable to read well which can have life-long consequences. Furthermore, government statistics show it is the youngest and most disadvantaged children who have been set back the most in reading following the disruption to education caused by the Covid pandemic.

Schoolreaders' volunteers act as positive role models, not only helping children improve their reading age but also their reading fluency, enjoyment and comprehension.

Antonia, retired, and a Schoolreaders volunteer, explains her experience, "Being a Schoolreaders volunteer has exceeded my expectations and is one of the best parts of my week. I can see the difference the reading makes to the children particularly in their







punctuation. Being able to read is the greatest gift you can give a child. They can go on to cook, build a rocket or run the country."

Jane Whitbread, who founded Schoolreaders ten years ago and

which now provides over 12,000 children with a weekly one-to-one reading session, concludes: "Schoolreaders are needed more than ever, especially for the youngest and most disadvantaged pupils to help them catch up on their reading."

"Children who leave primary school unable to read well will have trouble accessing their secondary education fully which can have life-long consequences.

"The beauty of our reading scheme is that not only does it benefit children and schools, but it also gives our volunteers a huge sense of satisfaction in sharing their love of reading."

Education For All

GOOD News has regularly featured the work of the Wulugu Project which is based in Great Melton and raises funds to tackle poverty through education in Northern Ghana. Here we inform readers of the latest updates in the project.

IN GHANA the school year begins in January. Most readers will not know that North Ghana is one of the most deprived, neglected, impoverished and inaccessible regions in Africa.

The most effective way to tackle poverty long-term is to ensure that education is easily available for all children. All evidence shows that this vastly decreases hunger, disease, early death, childhood marriage and tribal wars. If the education is carefully planned by the people themselves to meet their real needs and without loss of funding to corruption, then everyone wins.

In 2022, The Wulugu Project, had its most successful year ever.

In just one year the project has built or completely re-built seven schools where over 3,000 children are being taught. It is calculated that, for every child in school, at least 15 others will benefit directly or indirectly. That's 45,000 just for starters and many more will follow.

Lynne Symonds, founder of the charity, said:

"It is impossible to put a value on the support of local people who

understand what we want to do, know that raising funding from the major donors is impossible for small charities however successful they are, and trust us to make the maximum use of every penny.

"Two of our new schools were built in memory of family members by Norfolk people. Our volunteers in Ghana were overwhelmed by this. These legacies will continue to improve lives for generations to come.

"Meanwhile our 50 boreholes are providing clean water for approaching half a million who never imagined that they would ever have the luxury of uncontaminated water.

"Our to do list is long, including providing desks, equipment for our seven vocational schools for girls, rebuilding collapsed schools. We are expecting a drop in funding this year so would, as ever, be delighted to talk to anyone who might be looking for a charity that could really use their help."

You Can Take The Girl Out Of Norfolk But.....



VISITORS to Park Farm, Hethersett, may well recognise some of the landscapes featured in artwork on show in the hotel.

Park Farm is hosting an exhibition of the work of Jo Sharpe—an artist who now lives in London but who comes from the village.

Despite moving over 100 miles away,

Jo still looks upon herself as "a Norfolk girl."

Writing on her website she states:

"Having grown up in Norfolk, I am inspired by the great British countryside and coastline. My paintings show my love of painting, colour, creating surface pattern texture and playing with compositions. I mostly

paint in oils but also love to combine medias. My range of contemporary botanical prints are a real contrast to my oil paintings. But they also show my absolute passion for nature and love of colour and pattern, thanks to my textiles design background. "

Jo's website talks about the exhibition at Park Farm.

"In many a Walk is an exhibition at Park Farm Hotel with artworks by Jo Sharpe. She has created a collection remembering much-loved walks of local fields, celebrating the beautiful countryside of the village of Hethersett located seven miles south of Norwich on A11.

"Jo Sharpe is an artist who grew up in the village of Hethersett. She has always been inspired by this local countryside and in particular, and the walk around the Hethersett gravel pit, (now called Great Melton Farms) and the local oilseed rape fields adjacent to the Park Farm Country Hotel.

"During lockdown Jo could no longer stay in the family home as her parents had moved into a care home. It was a traumatic time for her and her family,



like so many families at that time, suffering not seeing their loved ones.

Jo explained:

"I sorely missed seeing my parents (James and Adele Hersey) and going on my familiar Hethersett walks. To feel closer to them and the village I painted several paintings of the local landscape and made a Norfolk themed series of paintings."

She spends quite some time with her interviewees and while the "chats" for the memories can be done over two to three weeks they often take a lot longer:

"I never rush things. The whole process has to be enjoyable and personal to the individual, the family or the group," she says.

Even after the book is finished, Liz often stays in touch with her subjects and says she has made a number of friends through the process. Most of her work to date has been local to Norfolk, although she has been as far afield as Newcastle and Brighton.

includes the whole process including personal one to one interviews, research, writing, designing and printing the finished high-quality glossy booklet

Roads In "Dreadful State"

THE parish council has complained to Norfolk Highways about "the dreadful state" of Henstead Road and Old Norwich Road following the re-surfacing work which took place before Christmas.

A complaint has also been lodged bout the poor state of the road surface in Mill Road which one resident has referred to as a danger to anyone unable to see properly or for those in wheelchairs.

Making Meetings More Interesting

Attendance for the village's annual parish meeting is historically low and the parish council is looking at ways of improving the numbers attending.

The annual parish meeting is for village residents rather than the parish council, although the council organises it.

This year's meeting will be on 19th April. The council is looking to "feature items that will appeal to residents."

Suggestions to date include presentations on the strategic gap, on the new Memorial Playing Field pavilion and one by the Hethersett Environmental Action Team (HEAT).

A number of displays are likely to be mounted including one from village archives. Other groups likely to be represented include village speedwatch.

Doors will be open at 7 pm with the formal part of the meeting taking place at 7.30 pm and light refreshments will also be provided.

Parish Shorts

Defibrillator Promise

The parish council is to supply a defibrillator for the outside wall of the new pavilion on the Memorial Playing Field. The council will undertake monthly checks on the machine and also supply replacement batteries and pads as and when needed.

Short Stay

The parish council has once again emphasised that the car park on Great Melton Road near Tesco Express is for short term parking only. Motorists have been ignoring this and leaving vehicles there for lengthy periods of time, although the council admits that there is little they can do to "police the situation."

For Back Garden

Taylor-Wimpey has provided a load of "substandard bricks" which have been broken up and placed in raised beds at the new Back Garden on land at the village hall.

Double Yellow Lines Extension Possibility

AN extension of double yellow lines down Henstead Road has come a step closer with the parish council voting to apply for a grant .

The council has put forward the line extension for funding under the Road Safety Community Fund.

The extension could see the current double yellows extended as far as the junction with Stuart Road and would help alleviate traffic problems in the area and make it easier for buses to turn into and out of Henstead Road.

Applications to the fund have to be made by April.

Exceeding Speed Limits

OVER half of motorists are exceeding 20 mph signs in the village.

The latest survey by a Sam 2 portable speed camera in Queen's Road close to the junction with Cann's Lane between 19th December 2022 and 31st January 2023 saw 127,844 vehicle movements past the speed detector.

Of that number, just over 54,000 kept to the 20 mph but over 73,000 exceeded it as our table opposite illustrates.


The camera shows and records speeding trends. It doesn't issue speeding tickets.

At February's parish council meeting, members agreed to note the figures.

The Sam monitor is being used in different areas of the village and will continue to be in place throughout 2023.



We've had two birthdays in our house in two weeks. The littlest






Lawrence celebrated her sixth birthday at the very end of January and my husband celebrated his big 4-0 in February.

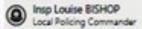

Hethersett Gardening Club

At our latest meeting Julia Stafford-Allen, of the National Garden Scheme [NGS], described the evolution of the opening of usually private gardens, to public view. This she said dated back to Henry VIII at Hampton Court, sometimes meeting Courtiers and Diplomats in its gardens.

The Tudor acolytes of Henry VIII began to copy the garden concept in their own Manor and Hall properties. Viewing of gardens started with the various Monarchs' "progresses", inviting themselves around Britain as guests of selected nobles.

Eventually gardens became less formulaic with temples, grottoes and statues appearing and the nobility started inviting friends to visit their gardens. From these beginnings a culture of ordinary people visiting gardens developed.

In 1859 a William Rathbone hired a nurse for his sick wife. In 1862 he was

setting up a school for nurses which became the Queen's Nursing Institute with Queen Victoria's support, and continued with other royal family patronage. In 1927 a Miss Elsie Wagg suggested opening gardens as a means of fund raising for the Queen's Nursing Institute [QNI] and in 1928 on the back of the proposal's success, the National Gardening Scheme evolved as a charity supporting district nursing. In 21st Century the NGS still supports the QNI as well as a wider range of charitable good causes.

In 2022 the national monies raised by the NGS for charitable causes was over £3m and Norfolk's gardens contributed £118,000. The 2023 handbook for Norfolk shows 62 properties intending to open at least once during the year.





A Mad Or A Fairy Tale King?

Herald columnist John Head tells us the strange story of the King of Bavaria.

MY trips around Bavaria over the years could not have been complete without visiting King Ludwig's castles. These are sometimes referred to as palaces, which indeed they are, however they are fortified in places. During this time I became riveted by this most controversial monarch who, during the period of his reign as King of Bavaria




1864 – 1886, managed to fritter away all the royal revenues on lavish castles and lifestyle.

Born on August 25th 1845 most of his childhood was spent in Hohenschwangau Castle (pictured above) where he was captivated by paintings of German legends as he developed a romantic outlook on life.

A pivotal moment in Ludwig's life was when he experienced the performance of Wagner's opera 'Lohengrin'. It is said that this is where his romantic dreams were realised.

On the death of Maximillian II in 1864 Ludwig became King of Bavaria at the age of 18. He had had little contact with the world and only met Bismarck, the prime minister of Prussia, for the first and only time in 1863. He was ill





prepared for his position but took his role as king seriously, particularly with that of art and culture.

As a result of this, he invited Richard Wagner to Munich where he became his patron. It was the beginning of a successful relationship.

In 1866, the threat of war was deepening between Austria and Prussia over the administration of Schleswig–Holstein. Ludwig wanted to keep Bavaria out of this quarrel but finding it impossible he decided to abdicate. Upon changing his mind, possibly by the influence of Wagner, he signed the mobilisation order against Prussia requested by Parliament. The three-week Austro – Prussian War was disastrous for Ludwig and Bavaria, which, being on the losing side, was forced to pay heavy reparation costs to Prussia.

Following the Austro-Prussian war and Ludwig's loss of power, he sought to

build a castle as his retreat from the modern world. Neuschwanstein Castle was built at an idyllic location near the ruins of Schwanstein Castle. It was also close to Hohenschwangau Castle where his childhood was spent.

It is believed that he built his 'new castle' as the centrepiece for an imagined kingdom—one in which he was the true king. The Castle was also dedicated to Richard Wagner, who now was becoming a close friend and confidant.

"The location is one of the most beautiful to be found, holy and unapproachable, a worthy temple ..." Ludwig wrote to Wagner.

The walls of Neuschwanstein are decorated with frescoes depicting scenes from the legends used in Wagner's operas, including Tannhäuser, Tristan und Isolde and Lohengrin. Ludwig chose to pay for the castle out of his personal fortune and






by means of extensive borrowing, rather than Bavarian public funds. Construction began in 1869, but was never fully completed.

I believe it was from this building that Ludwig also became known as the 'Swan King' as I witnessed many depictions and references to the 'Knight of the Swan' Lohengrin. The fairy-tale design of Neuschwanstein formed the basis of Disney's castle in Sleeping Beauty although a few other features were added to make it more mystical.

In 1870 tensions grew between Prussia



Bavaria fought well as the German armies went from success to success which would see the unification of all German states into one large Reich. Ludwig regained some of the status that he had lost.

Concern over Ludwig's castle building

Linderhof Castle and the Venus Grotto

Richard Wagner and his construction of outlandish castles started to cause political intrigue and personal attacks against him. He became isolated only venturing out at night.

The lonely king grew into the 'fairy tale king' as he concentrated on the building of his castles. The construction of Linderhof Castle, near Oberammergau, began in 1874. This contained the Venus Grotto which again captured Ludwig's fascination of Wagnerian operas. This artificial dripstone cave with its lake and waterfall was modelled on the Hörselberg from the first act of the Wagner opera "Tannhäuser".

My lasting memory of this beautiful

building which contains 10 lavishly furnished rooms (of which only four have a real function) is that of the beautiful Meissen ornaments displaying birds and flowers. They are unique as Ludwig ensured the moulds were broken after they were produced.

From 1878 onward the splendid Herrenchiemsee Castle was erected on Herren Island in the Chiemsee. It

was modelled on Versailles containing an impressive wall of mirrors as a tribute to Louis XIV of France, the magnificent "Sun King".

It was the largest, but also the last of Ludwig's building projects and remains, even today, unfinished. I can remember being guided around this luxurious building and coming to the final door which, when opened, displayed just the bare brick walls. The contrast came as a complete shock to me as it was completely unexpected.

The mysterious death of King Ludwig II

In June 1886, there was a meeting of the House of Wittelsbach, including members of the royal family, to discuss what methods could be used to bring King Ludwig II to attend to affairs of state and to cut down his extravagant programme of castle building.

The danger existed that the family fortune accumulated over 800 years could be spent in a single generation. However, a conspiracy had already started by a group of politicians to have Ludwig declared insane. A medical report was provided by physicians by order of the government to have him 'regally incapacitated'.

This report challenged Ludwig's ability

to make his decisions of his own free will. The physicians involved in this report did not have the opportunity to examine Ludwig and therefore it contained mainly incriminations and absurdities.

The plot to remove Ludwig needed the agreement of the German Emperor. An approach was made to the Chancellor, Bismarck, who was not in agreement with such a move. He left the decision to the Bavarians and made them solely responsible for the action.

On 10th June, 1886, a delegation of ministers, aristocrats and physicians arrived at Neuschwanstein Castle demanding admittance but failed to gain entry. Ludwig had members of the delegation taken into custody but released later.

This stalled the course of events although Bismarck wanted Ludwig to take control by standing up for his rights before the Bavarian Parliament in Munich.

Ludwig was by now exhausted and had 'toyed' with the idea of committing suicide but waited to see what would happen. Though an act of treachery he was captured and led to his bedroom where he was told he had been declared insane by evidence not examination and Prince Luitpold had taken the Regency.

He was escorted to Berg Castle by Starnberg Lake which had been fortified as a prison.

On the morning of Whitsunday, June 13th 1886, following an accompanied walk through the castle grounds, Ludwig returned to the castle with Dr. von Gudden, the chief public health officer, who then expressed optimism to all in attendance concerning treatment of the royal patient.

Ludwig then dined alone before wanting another walk late in the

afternoon and was again accompanied by Dr. Von Gudden who made a sign to two keepers not to follow them.

By 7 pm the physicians and servants at the castle became concerned that the two had not returned. At 11 pm, after an extensive search of the castle arounds, both men were found floating dead in Starnberg Lake.

There was already much confusion as the official announcement from the Royal Police Administration in Munich on June 14th stated that both men had shown weak signs of life, however, a day later, it was officially declared the king and his physician had already been dead and floating in the water for up to three hours.

The contradiction was explained by the attempts to resuscitate being conceived as signs of life by some bystanders who gave false reports to the newspapers.

After his death it was important that the people of Bavaria remained calm and given proof that King Ludwig was mentally ill.

The press was inundated with such 'proofs'. The post mortem findings, which were disputed, were also published. These findings concentrated on the weight of Ludwig's 'shrinking' brain.

Ludwig's death was officially recorded as suicide by drowning although his autopsy revealed no water was shown in his lungs and he was a strong swimmer when he was young. Further he was found in water which was only



waist deep.

Conspiracy Theories

Speculation exists that Ludwig was murdered by his enemies while attempting to escape from Berg.

Following the death of a witness, who was sworn to secrecy during his lifetime, papers were found suggesting that Ludwig had been shot. However, the autopsy report indicated that no scars or wounds were found on the body of the dead king. Many years later a countess displayed to her guest a coat with two bullet holes in the back alleging it was the one Ludwig was wearing on the night he died.

Another theory suggested that Ludwig died of natural causes, such as a heart attack or stroke, brought on by the cool water of the lake during an escape attempt.

Overall, time has put everything in its place. Ludwig's desire to make Bavaria beautiful and culturally rich turned into reality. It is one of the richest regions in Europe and his castles/palaces attract millions of tourists each year. At the end of his life, the total sum of Ludwig's debts was 14,000,000 marks, but it is more than clear that his cultural legacy has paid all the debts and helped to bring prosperity to his beloved Bavaria.

Ludwig may have been mad spending the royal inheritances but the fairy tale king provided a cultural legacy which I, together with many others, have benefited from.

At our February meeting we had a most fascinating and amusing talk by Robert Smith M.B.E. the harbourmaster of Wells on the North Norfolk coast. Robert was born and raised in Wells along with several generations of the family. He had a stint of doing hard physical work in awful conditions as a fisherman. However, for the last 30 years, he has been the Harbourmaster.

He described that Wells is legally administered by a panel of commissioners who employ the harbourmaster. In 1663 under an Act of Parliament, the commissioners were made responsible for repairing the quay and landing place and checking the creeks and channel. Robert is fully aware of the weather and how changes in it and tides can affect the safety of sailors.

Sailors from all over Europe look for a mooring. Robert described all the facilities there are for them, but the most important information they need are the internet details. Robert gave a brief summary of the history of Wells. In its heyday, it was an important manufacturing town. Malt was exported and grain was supplied to London. The town had many coaching houses frequented by Nelson and other well known folk like Coke, Walpole and Captain Bligh. Robert's job is varied. What he enjoys most is being out at sea, alone, in the dead of night, with the moon and stars lighting his way back to harbour. Robert founded a Maritime Trust which gives children and young people support in learning to swim and to be confident in maritime environments. He has an interesting life.
